KLAMATH COUNTY has no money budgeted to pay for the special state election on July 21, and will have to go into the red to the tune of some \$4,000 in order to meet the cost.

Not so good, in these days of protested warrants.

LISTEN: Klamath county will have to go deeper into the red if it is compelled to stand the cost of an altogether unjustified recall election directed against T. R. Gillenwaters, district attorney.

WHY UNJUSTIFIED? Here is why: The recall is intended as a drastic remedy for corruption or incompetence in office so serious as to threaten the whole structure of government if permitted to go until another general election comes around.

No such charges are involved in the proposed recall. They are not even intimated.

THIS writer, who is a new-comer, but deeply interested in this community, whose future progress means EVERYTHING to all of us, hopes sincerely that the proposed recall does not materialize.

It can do the community NO good, and will certainly do a LOT of harm.

ARE YOU in the mood today for a little cheer? If you are, here are some figures that should look good to you:

For the week ending July 1, steel mill operations were UP 253.3 per cent from the corresponding week of 1932. For this week ending March 16, they were DOWN 40 per cent.

For the week ending June 17, the latest for which figures are available, car loadings are up 13.4 per cent from the corresponding week of 1932. For the week ending March 18, they were down 23.1 per cent.

For the week ending June 24, electrical power production was up 10.9 per cent from the corresponding week of 1932. For the week ending March 18, it was down 10.6 per cent.

COMMENTING on these changes, George F. Roberts, a vice president of the National City bank of New York, and one of the country's outstanding economists, says:

"This is the most impressive showing of business recovery EVER MADE in a comparable period in this country."

That sounds pretty big, doesn't it?

THESE increases in production are bringing about an increase in purchasing power.

From April to May, there was a gain of five per cent in factory employment and of 11 per cent in dollar payrolls. That is to say, more people were employed at better wages. These figures are all the more impressive when

ELIMINATION OF CHANCELLOR

Hitler Denounces Groups In Conflict With Nazi Political Ambitions

Assertion Against Majority Quiets Doubts of Reichstag Meeting

BERLIN, July 7. (UP)—All remaining traces of democracy in Germany must be eliminated, Chancellor Adolf Hitler declared in a speech made public today.

The Nazi chieftain, speaking to a conference of state governors here last night, asserted that he had successfully blasted all other major political parties from the scene, leaving Germany's government in the hands of his own Nazi party.

Denounced Majority

Hitler, in characteristic vein, dramatically denounced majority rule, which he asserted must be replaced by "individual responsibility."

The chancellor said that the forces of revolution must be led into the channels of evolution and that economic conditions must be bettered. He said in this connection that he had no intention of replacing economic experts who happened not to be Nazis by Nazis who had not a sound foundation in economics.

"Such a theoretical coordination," Hitler asserted, "would bring the workers no bread. History will judge us in the light not how many economists we deposited, but whether we understood how to create employment."

Hollywood Rifts Unparalleled by Actions Friday

HOLLYWOOD, July 7. (UP)—Separations in the Richard Dix and William Powell families today climaxed a week of film colony marital difficulties almost unparalleled in Hollywood history.

The estrangement of Dix and his San Francisco socialite wife, the former Winifred Cox, may not necessarily result in a divorce.

Carole Lombard, however, has gone to Reno with the intention of establishing residence to seek a divorce from Powell, her sartorially precise husband. Her marriage lasted two years.

Governor Meier Will Not Attend Sacramento Meet

SALEM, July 7. (UP)—Governor Julius L. Meier of Oregon will not attend the annual governors' conference which begins at Sacramento, July 23.

"Coming to the head of a special election, state business will be at its peak, and it will be my duty to remain in Oregon," the governor said.

Young Roosevelt May Buy Into Club

BOSTON, July 7. (UP)—James A. Roosevelt, eldest son of the president, and Judge Emil E. Fuchs are planning to buy the Boston Braves, of which Fuchs is already part owner. But neither of them would admit it tonight.

It was reported that they are ready to purchase control of the club from Chairman F. Adams, principal owner. In a move to reorganize direction of the team.

F. R. TO SPUR TARDY BUSINESS

Slow Industries May Face Anti-Trust Suits Is Warning of Cummings

WASHINGTON, July 7. (UP)—The administration's attempt to make tardy industries agree on means of spreading work and raising pay found the slow warning in forthright fashion today that they may have to fight anti-trust suits.

The warning, in no milder words, was issued by Attorney General Cummings.

"Industrial and other groups must abide by the terms and conditions of the anti-trust laws, unless and until they obtain actual exemption from certain of the requirements thereof by formulating a code under the national recovery act and obtaining its approval by the president."

His announcement followed a speech by Donald Richberg, general counsel of the recovery administration, in which he told the merchants' association of New York that unless business takes advantage of the chance for self-government "the advance of political control over private industry is inevitable."

Fast Train Jumps Tracks, Damages Set At \$250,000

TRINIDAD, Texas, July 7. (UP)—Two persons were killed and two others injured today when a fast Cotton Belt freight train bound from St. Louis to the Rio Grande valley was derailed while crossing a creek trestle a mile east of here. Fifteen cars left the tracks.

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Two The Dalles Men Drown in Columbia

THE DALLES, July 7. (UP)—Searching parties tonight had failed to find the bodies of two men, Clarence Woodruff and Leo Denis, both of The Dalles, who drowned today while fishing in the Columbia river.

Woodruff slipped while attempting to enter a boat and Denis leaped in to rescue him. Both men were swept into a narrow channel of the main river.

U. S. DISPLAYS DESIRE TOWARD KEEPING PARLEY

Secretary Hull Will Talk Privately With Heads of 66 Representations

Provisional Adoption of Monetary, Economic Program Is Probable

LONDON, July 7. (UP)—The United States delegation today continued its efforts to keep the world economic conference alive, despite threatening opposition led by the French and other members of the gold standard nations.

Secretary of State Cordell Hull, chairman of the American group, said tonight that he planned a series of private talks with the heads of the other 66 delegates present at the parley, in an effort to work out a practical program for the continuation of the conference.

Survey Made

The United Press surveyed the major members of the steering committee on how they felt toward continuing the parley and it appears that they meet again Monday to consider carrying on or adjourning for the last time, the vote will be close, probably seven for continuing and six for adjournment.

In the event another impasse appears, it may result in an adjournment for "provisional" continuation of the conference, Hull intimated—meaning adoption of a certain monetary and economic program when and if currencies are stabilized.

The chief action of the day came in the submission of an immediate monetary questions which voted to discuss all monetary matters, despite the struggle of the gold nations against monetary discussions at the economic conference until currency stabilization was seriously considered.

The committee adopted a proposal by Neville Chamberlain, British chancellor of the exchequer, to discuss all six items on the committee's agenda—credit policy, price levels, limitation of currency fluctuation, exchange control, indebtedness and resumption of lending. The vote was 25 to 15, the Soviets abstaining.

Impressive Fete Planned Sunday For Bay Bridge

SAN FRANCISCO, July 7. (UP)—Ground breaking ceremonies for the projected \$75,000,000 San Francisco-Oakland bay bridge, to be the largest span in the world, will be held Sunday at Yerba Buena island.

A celebration as impressive as the great engineering project itself is planned. Governor James Rolph, Jr., will sink a spade in the new lawn in front of the admiral's residence on the island, marking the spot where hard-rock miners will start the tunnel that will pierce the island and form the centerpiece of the gigantic structure.

President Roosevelt will then press a golden key at Washington, setting off three blasts—one on the island, one of Rincon hill, San Francisco, and a third at the foot of Fourteenth street, Oakland.

Licenses Doubled To Date in State

SALEM, July 7. (UP)—To date, automobile licenses issued by the secretary of State's office have almost doubled the number issued for a corresponding period of 1932.

MIDLAND, July 7. —Two small sons of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Smith are recovering from injuries received this week.

One of the boys shot several of his fingers off when a gun he was holding accidentally discharged. The other boy is recovering from severe leg lacerations received when a team ran away at the Earl Mack ranch near Spring Lake.

Four Crews Meet Today

WASHINGTON OARSMEN WILL COMPETE WITH TEAMS FROM EAST

LONG BEACH, Cal., July 7. (UP)—The crews of Yale and Washington appeared the class of the country today as they sent their shells to victories in their respective heats of the national intercollegiate rowing championship.

LONG BEACH, Cal., July 7. (UP)—Washington and Harvard won the right to compete with Yale and Cornell in tomorrow's final of the national intercollegiate rowing championship by eliminating the University of California at Los Angeles in the second of two heats held this afternoon.

Washington was four boat lengths ahead of Harvard. U. C. A. was a length behind Harvard.

LONG BEACH, Cal., July 7. (UP)—The eight oared crews of Yale and Cornell became finalists in the pursuit of the national intercollegiate championship by eliminating California in the first of the two preliminary heats held here this afternoon.

Yale took the lead at the 1000 meters, the half way mark, and never lost it. The Blue crew swept across the finish line a full length ahead of Cornell. California was two lengths behind Cornell.

STATE WITNESS DENIES CHARGES

Report of Lodge Officer Completed In Strange Cult Burial Episode

MARTINEZ, Cal., July 7. (UP)—Pablo Bustamante, the state's chief witness in the trial of seven Filipinos charged with burying an unfaithful wife while she yet lived, ended his testimony here today with strong denials that he himself had killed the woman.

The trial was adjourned until Tuesday morning, when Dr. John Craft will tell for the state how he believes the woman, Mrs. Cecilia Navarro, 29, met death.

Special Election Is Necessary on Attorney Recall

A special election will be required to recall District Attorney T. R. Gillenwaters, according to a press report from State officials at Salem Friday evening.

The special election would be necessary since the deadline for filing completed petitions has expired, the report stated.

Schermerhorn Makes Alibi, State Declares

MEDFORD, July 7. (UP)—Gordon Schermerhorn, charged with election ballot theft, took pains to establish a time alibi, the state charged late today in its opening statement to the jury hearing the case against the former school teacher.

Prosecutor Ralph Moody said he would not prove Schermerhorn guilty of the charge, but would prove the sheriff told many persons "he wanted them to remember he was seen at a certain time."

Great Northern Petitions for Cut

PORTLAND, July 7. (UP)—The Great Northern has petitioned the interstate commerce commission to cut its basic passenger rate from 3.6 cents a mile to 2 cents, Henry Dickson, city passenger agent, announced today.

FLOOD SWEEPS COLORADO AFTER BIG CLOUDBURST

Eight Foot Wall of Water Leaves Destruction In Three Canon Cities

Means of Communication Disrupted; Patrolmen Guard Devastated Area

MORRISON, Col., July 7. (UP)—At least a dozen lives were lost today as a sudden mountain cloudburst poured a 16-foot wall of water down Bear Creek canyon upon a string of resort towns and fishing cabins.

Two towns, Morrison and Starbuck, were almost wiped out as the torrential flood struck, and scores of cabins along the canyon between the two points were destroyed.

MORRISON, Col., July 7. (UP)—Sweeping down out of the mountains with dramatic and terrible swiftness, a wall of water eight feet deep today left death and destruction in its wake as it roared down Bear Creek canyon through the towns of Morrison, Starbuck and Morrison.

Telephone communication with other points along the canyon was cut off completely, giving rise to unfounded rumors that as many as 20 persons had died as the flood, resulting from a cloudburst in the mountains above this place, swept down the canyon.

Two Killed

It was known definitely that two persons were missing, swept away by the swirling torrent, and the toll of dead and missing was expected to increase as reports came from other points.

Property damage of about \$50,000 was done in Morrison alone, and it was expected that heavy loss had been incurred at other places.

Wage Increases Announced for Northern Firms

PORTLAND, July 7. (UP)—Sperry Flour company employees were rejoicing tonight over the news of a 10 per cent wage increase and bonus restoring all wages lost since their salaries were dropped 10 per cent last February.

Lumber Workers Form Union At Meeting Friday

MARSHFIELD, July 7. (UP)—Officials of the Oregon Coast Highway association moved today to force all highway contractors to use lumber mill operators who threatened to demand that wood instead of steel and concrete be used in making the bridges.

Ocean Traffic Revival Noticed

PORTLAND, July 7. (UP)—Revival in ocean traffic has led the Steamer Ship company of Portland to recondition three laid-up steamers for inter-coastal trade, it was announced here tonight.

The States Steamship company is beginning to recondition all of its laid-up vessels in anticipation of a rise in trans-Pacific trade. All 31 of the two companies' ships, many of which have been idle for two years, are expected to be in operation shortly.

Gasoline Boosts Decreases Revenue

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 7. (UP)—Recent boosts in the price of gasoline has resulted in a decrease of \$440,000 in gasoline tax revenue to the state during the past three months, as compared with the corresponding period a year ago, State Treasurer Otto Case revealed today.

SALEM, July 7. (UP)—Gas tax refunds in Oregon this year averaged \$500 a month more than the 1932 period, the secretary of state's office revealed today.

WORLD LABORER ACTION SOUGHT

Shorter Hours, Increased Wages and Agriculture Prices Before Nations

LONDON, July 7. (UP)—World-wide action for shorter hours for labor and increased wages and agricultural prices is called for in a resolution drafted in American headquarters today for presentation to the world economic conference.

While the whole United States delegation had not formally approved the proposal this morning, it was quickly accepted by several members and its sponsors expected to introduce it without great delay.

Ask Wage Boost

Pointing to widespread distress and unemployment in all countries, the resolution declared for "lessened hours of labor and a steadily rising scale of wages and agricultural prices."

Exactly paralleling important features of President Roosevelt's American program for recapturing prosperity, the proposal was advanced at a moment when conference action on monetary and tariff matters was blocked by the refusal of European and bloc representatives to discuss those subjects.

Accordingly, the Americans believed the way open for action on shortening hours and boosting wages and prices.

Thomas Requests Additional Money For Investigation

SALEM, July 7. (UP)—Authority to spend an additional \$27,300 on investigation of the California Oregon Power company and other Oregon public utilities was sought today by C. M. Thomas, state utilities commissioner.

Lumber Operators Favor Wood Bridges

Carl Brooks was elected president of the Loggers, Timber and Sawmill Workers' union when it was organized and presented a charter as an affiliate of the American Federation of Labor at a meeting Friday evening.

Initiation was held and 250 members signed. A regular meeting will be held each Friday evening at the labor temple.

An open meeting is scheduled for Sunday morning at 10 o'clock. The place of meeting will be announced later.

Similar organizations have been formed recently at Chiloquin and White Horse, Cal.

Press Time News Flashes

SALEM, July 7. (UP)—All state banks in Oregon today were ordered to make reports on their financial condition June 30. The call sent out by State Bank Superintendent A. A. Schramm, was the first since the national banking moratorium.

MATTERN SENDS SAFETY REPORT FROM SIBERIA

Lone Round-the-World Air Man, Lost Since June 14, In Northland

Announcement Received by Russian Aviation Officers; Sent Monday

NEW YORK, July 7. (UP)—An expedition to rescue James Mattern, round the world flier stranded in Siberia, has left Terrace, B. C., for Siberia, according to word received here tonight.

CHICAGO, July 7. (UP)—A single word, "safe," came crackling through the ether today and turned on a projected world flight into an official celebration.

The single word message came by radio to four Chicago men who financed Jimmy Mattern's attempted flight around the world and it indicated that the flier had been safe in a Siberian village all the day when his friends feared that he had perished.

MOSCOW, July 7. (UP)—Jimmy Mattern, popular young Texas aviator missing since mid-June on a projected world flight from New York, was reported alive and well tonight at the little trading post of Anadirak, on the Anadir river, in far north-eastern Siberia, a desolate region just under the Arctic circle.

Mattern's safety was related in a brief message signed by him received by Soviet aviation officials this afternoon. It was sent July 5 from Bocharovo, on the Chukotka peninsula, in Siberia, but contained no details.

Message Not Understood

Officials surmised that the message, written in English, was undecipherable to the Russians at the trading post, and was forwarded, otherwise, to contact Mattern to Bocharovo for transmission to the government in Moscow.

The Soviet air ministry at once issued instructions to Mark Shvetsky, chief of the northern aviation service, to contact Mattern and forward details of his situation and whether he needed help to return to civilization.

Shvetsky's service previously had been ordered to search for Mattern and all outposts were instructed to keep a vigilant watch. Shvetsky expressed surprise that Mattern by himself had been able to obtain his own means of informing the world of his whereabouts.

Hurricane Hits Farm Houses on Mexican River

REYNOSA, Mexico, July 7. (UP)—Reports from North Mexico tonight said that 10 persons were killed in a hurricane there. Mexican authorities here said that farm houses for 100 miles along the Soto La Marina river had been devastated.

The reports said the damage extended 50 miles each way from the river, and that the Chamel ranch, one of the largest projects in the area, was wiped out.

Villages Wrecked

The report partially verified accounts of V. A. Dorrell, Pan-American pilot, who flew from Tampico to Brownsville over the stricken area. Dorrell said the little fishing villages of Soto La Marina were "flattened out" and that nearby villages for a distance of 25 miles were wrecked by the hurricane which veered off the Texas coast late yesterday.

Dorrell was unable to determine from the air whether any persons were dead.

LOS ANGELES, July 7. (UP)—Lieutenant Commander Frank M. Hawks took off at 7:25 p. m. today on a projected non-stop flight to Atlanta, Ga., in his robot-controlled speed plane.
