CALIFORNIA MAKES GAME LAW CHANGES

Drastic changes in California game laws have been brought about in bills recently signed by the governor, according to official announcements in the Serrice Bulletin, monthly publication sent out to members of the state division of fish and game.

Another bill provides for an open season and bag limits on Chinese pheasants, with the bag limit set at two cocks per day from November 15 to 20, both days inclusive.

A measure prohibiting the importation of muskrats into the interior valleys of California has also been signed, and permits birds and animals legally killed in other states to be brought into California.

Ellsworth Vines Loses To Jack Crawford, Australian, In Wimbledon Final Round

WIMBLEDON, England, July 7. (AP)—Jack Crawford, Australian star, won the final round of the men's singles, and with it the Wimbledon championship from Ellsworth Vines today, 4-6, 11-9, 6-2, 2-6, 6-4.

The Australian became, temporarily at least, king of the tennis world as he added the prized Wimbledon title to that of his native land and of France.

BIG LEAGUE CLUBS GO TO WORK AGAIN

With their all-star argument a matter of record, major league clubs, with some exceptions, returned to the normal course of baseball today, inaugurating new inter-sectional series in both circuits.

The western National League clubs, who suffered painful reverses in their recent tour of the east, resumed their home stands against eastern opposition while the American leaguers from the midlands, figuring perhaps they could do worse on the road, began an attempt to head the powerful eastern clubs in their own dens.

The St. Louis Cardinals, who lost 13 to 21 games on the road, 16 of them in the east, opened at home against the Brooklyn Dodgers. The Cincinnati Reds, who won only four games of 16 in the east, tackled the revived Boston Braves, and the Chicago Cubs dug in to withstand an invasion by the New York Giants, leading the National league by 2 1/2 games.

Numerous limit catches and some great big ones were taken at Rocky Point during the recent holidays, according to anglers and game wardens.

J., for the lead in the British open golf championship.
