How About Peck?

A couple of weeks ago, with the Indians in the depths of a slump, the Cleveland front office gave a very large rate to Roger Peckinpau and made Walter Johnson manager.

Since then the team has shown no indication of snapping out of the doldrums, though Johnson has done everything a smart baseball man could do toward that end.

Babe Gives Lowdown

Now along comes Babe Ruth and says the Indians never will be a winning team as long as it plays in the huge lakefront stadium where home runs are as rare as hens' six-year molar.

"The Indians were hard to beat in old League Park," says Babe. "They had a tough team, with batters who had power enough to reach that short rightfield wall. The same power exerted now gives them pop flies."

"Yesterday I quit trying to hit homers in this big park. I decided to shorten up my swing for any kind of hit. I have found it useless to swing as I naturally swing in other parks to get home runs. Gehrig hit a couple here the other day that would have been homers in any other park."

Too Many Games

The Babe was asked if the big park didn't have the same effect on visiting teams that it bore on the Indians, making it as fair for one as for another.

"Well, the Indians have to play half their schedule here—77 games. Each visiting team plays only 11 games in this overgrown pasture. Any team that would have to play 77 games in this lot would fold up."

"A homer over the right field wall in the old park had to travel only 290 feet. Compare that with the 400 feet a homer has to travel now—and that 400 feet is right near the foul line, on either side of the field. It just isn't being done. I never hit a home run in this park. Neither has Gehrig. Al Simmons or Jimmy Fox. There's the answer for you."

There's the answer, gentlemen. But just what does that make Roger Peckinpau, the manager who was fired because the Indians couldn't win? You guess!

DENSMORE SHUTE WINS OPEN CROWN

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, July 8. (AP)—H. Densmore Shute, 26-year-old American professional from Philadelphia, today captured the British open golf championship, besting his countryman, Craig Wood of Deal, N. J., in an all-American 36-hole playoff.

Shute led from the first hole to the last, defeated Wood by five strokes with a fine exhibition of all around shot-making.

The new champion shot the double round in 75-74—149, only three strokes over par for the 36 holes.

Wood's score was 78-74—154.

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland, July 8. (AP)—Densmore Shute led Craig Wood by six strokes today after 27 holes of their all-American battle for the British open golf championship.

Shute shot the first 18 holes in 75, two over par, while Wood, dropping five strokes to par in the first four holes, posted a 78. Although neither was particularly impressive, especially on the inward nine, Shute was much more consistent all the way.

The all-American duel for Britain's most coveted golfing trophy was staged under ideal conditions, for an overnight storm had drenched the links and softened the fairways backed solid by the dry weather of the past few weeks.

PORTLAND BOY
TACOMA, Wash., July 8. (AP)—Wayne Sabin, Portland, won the northwest boys' singles tennis championship yesterday, defeating Edmund Russell of Hollywood, 12-10, 6-4.

The first set was a grueling affair, but the southern lad wilted under the steady driving of the Portlander in the second.

CHINA BOY WINS; THILL HANDED K.O.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 8. (AP)—After knocking his opponent down four times, Ah Wing Lee, Portland Chinese, whipped out a hard left to the chin that sent Eddie Anderson of Chicago to the canvas for the full count in the third round of the scheduled 10-round main event of the fight card here last night. Lee weighed 136½ lb. and Anderson's 139.

The Chinese was the aggressor at the start of the first round, pounding Lee into the ropes with a hard right. But the Chinese fighter retorted with a left to the chin that dropped Anderson for a count of four. Lee floored his opponent again in the second round for a fourth count.

Lee assumed the aggressive in the third round, whipping a left to the body and following it with a left to the jaw that dropped Anderson for a count of eight. Another left sent Anderson back again for a count of eight. He rallied, to drive a hard right to Lee's stomach. Then the Chinese caught Anderson with a steaming left to the jaw that sent him over on his back for the full count. Anderson was unable to leave his corner for about 10 minutes.

Jandy Andy Bandy, 129, Oakland, Calif., won the semi-windup, scoring a technical knockout over Paul Thill, 128, Klamath Falls, in the second of six scheduled rounds. The referee stopped the fight believing Thill was hopelessly outclassed.

Hal Moe, 171, former Oregon State College halfback, opened his professional fighting career with a first-round knockout over Dade Plincketh, 165, Portland, sleeping from his corner at the opening bell. Moe crashed a left to his opponent's jaw for the finishing punch.

Red Tinzler, 185, Bellingham, took a four-round decision from Stanley Gard, 157, San Francisco. Paul Karch, 151, Portland, defeated Dick Johnson, 154, Portland, decision, four rounds. Louis Nelson, 135, Portland, took a four-round decision from young Harry Wilke, 138, Longview, Wash. Whitney Neal, 128, Portland, knocked out Danny Ramon, 129, Filipino from Manila, in the third round of the scheduled four-round opener.

SACRAMENTO SLIPS IN COAST RACE; LOS ANGELES, DUCKS GAIN THROUGH VICTORIES

The strong arms of Jack Lell-vett's Angel moundsmen and the big bats of his sluggers are fast bearing out the June prediction of Manager Oscar Vitt of Hollywood that Los Angeles is the team to beat in the 1933 Coast league pennant race.

Last night the Angels handed the Missions a double licking 9-3 and 7-2, to make it six straight for the current series. Dick Ward checked the once dangerous Reds with ten hits in the opener, while Wynn Ballon slammed the ball over the left field fence in the fifth inning to run his consecutive game hitting streak to 42, seven short of the record set by Jack Neas of Oakland in 1915. He had to share slugging honors last night with his brother, Vincent, who drove in three Hollywood runs with a double and four bagger. First Baseman Ray Jacobs of the Stars hit his 26th circuit clout of the year.

The victories left Los Angeles only a game behind the Sacramento Senators, who spent a bad evening at Oakland. The Oaks knocked off the league leaders twice last night, 6-2 and 7-1, for their first wins of the week.

HELEN KEEPS HER WIMBLEDON TITLE
WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 8. (AP)—Mrs. Helen Wills Moody successfully defended her Wimbledon championship today against Miss Dorothy Round, 6-4, 6-3, after losing her first set in women's singles competition in six years.

While Mrs. Moody's victory, which gave her her sixth Wimbledon women's single crown and equalled the record set by Suzanne Lenglen, was generally expected, the opposition provided by Miss Round, England's second ranked woman player, provided an unexpected sensation for the king and queen of England and the throngs that packed the stands.

Not since Gwyneth Steery, British girl, won a set from her in an early round of the first Wimbledon title tourney Mrs. Moody won in 1927, has the California girl won by anything but straight sets in women's singles competition.

Miss Round, a clever stylist with a beautifully rounded game, gave the American queen of tennis a thrilling battle and Mrs. Moody, scarcely ever pressed in title competition in the past half dozen years, needed all her severity of striking and control to pull out the victory.

One Title Saved
In doing so she saved one of the two great singles championships the men and women stars of the world have been battling for here through two weeks of play. Ellsworth Vines, leader of the United States Davis cup forces, went down to defeat in defense of the men's singles crown yesterday, losing to Jack Crawford, brilliant Australian, in five bitter sets.

The tremendous improvement in Miss Round's game, now one of the most versatile in women's ranks, was demonstrated by her advance to this year's finals.
