Screw-Ball Hubbell
Carl Hubbell of the Giants and his screw ball have gone on record with a performance that probably will not be equaled for several seasons.

Defining Hubbell's chief stock in trade, the screw ball, is taking a chance on stirring up a flood of letters from fans who have different ideas of how a screw ball acts.

A screw ball thrown by a left-handed pitcher breaks down and away from a right-handed batter and is an in-drop to a left-handed hitter.

Like Matty's Specialty
Christy Mathewson had the same kind of curve Hubbell hurled, but coming from Matty's right hand it was called a fade-away.

Anyway, when Hubbell came up from Oklahoma City to Detroit in 1926, Ty Cobb scrutinized the slim young six-footer carefully. When Ty learned that

Back in 1929 he pitched the only no-hit-no-run game of the major league season . . . he is tall, slender and wiry . . . one of a family of several ball-playing brothers . . . he took a younger brother, Merritt, to the Giants training camp last spring. . . Once in Chicago McGraw slew Hubbell with words . . . with men on first and third, McGraw suspecting a possible double steal ordered Catcher O'Farrell to whip the ball back to Hubbell, who was to fire it to third. . . but Hubbell forgot . . . and ducked under O'Farrell's fine whip as the man on first started for second and the ball rolled to center field . . . McGraw's reflections were deleted by the censors.

Hubbell was pitching a screw ball he urged him to forget it, advising the recruit that it would ruin his arm. The screw ball happened to be something Carl learned as a kid on the Oklahoma lots, and he decided to stick with it even though it did carry him to Toronto that year.

McGraw Sees Him
From Toronto Hubbell drifted to the Three-Eye league and Texas league where McGraw himself spotted him. The Giants paid \$40,000, he reported in 1928 and never has had a season in which he lost more than he won.

Even in that disastrous 1932 campaign, Hubbell came up with 18 victories against 11 defeats. Hereafter pitching for a seventh place club.

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA WILL TAKE UP CREW RACING; ACTION FOLLOWS HUSKIES' VICTORY

LOS ANGELES, July 10 (AP)—University of Southern California, for a number of years a prominent figure nationally in intercollegiate athletics, announced today its intention of adding crew racing to its sports program.

The announcement followed on the heels of the successful first running of the national sprint championship which Washington's sturdy oarsmen won at Long Beach Saturday in a sensational race to the finish with Yale.

This Year, Perhaps
While the date when the men of Troy, famed for their conquests on cinder path and football field, will launch into naval activities was not fixed, it was considered likely that the move would come during the next school term.

What with California, Washington and the University of California already actively engaged in the sport, it was considered probable that Stanford might take up the sport again.

Coach Major Goodsell, rowing mentor of the University of California at Los Angeles, whose activities resulted in bringing the sprint championship to Southern California less than a year after the sport was successfully inaugurated during the Olympic games started making plans today for another such regatta on a larger scale next summer.

Big Meet Planned
With the possibility of four western boats in the race next year Goodsell, former world's professional single scull champion, said it was his plan to invite as many eastern eights, including winners of the Poughkeepsie 4-mile classic and the other outstanding eastern races.

Some fifteen thousand persons witnessed the finale of the sprint championship Saturday when the Huskies edged out Yale by six feet after a thrilling 2000-meter in 6 minutes and 33 4-5 seconds. Cornell was third, a length and a half behind the Sons of Eli, with Harvard last, two lengths in the wake of the Ithaca crew.

California and U. C. L. A. had been eliminated in the preliminary heats Friday.

Before leaving by steamship with his victorious crew late yesterday, Coach Alva Ulbricksen headed much praise for the triumph on slight shoulders of Coxswain Harvey Love.
