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the family to verify or deny the abduction, the news was confirmed from other sources.

First intimation of the kidnapping came when O'Connell's automobile was found unoccupied in front of the family residence early Friday. His whereabouts could not be determined.

Later, the abductors communicated with the family by telephone to open negotiations for payment of the money in return for the youth's freedom.

Oppose Roosevelt
Young O'Connell is a nephew of Daniel P. and Edward J. O'Connell, who with John O'Connell, Sr., control Albany county democratic politics. They possess wide influence and are known as upstate political chieftains. Edward is Albany county democratic chairman.

Through their opposition to President Roosevelt's candidacy at the democratic national convention in Chicago a year ago, and through their past associations with Tammany Hall, the O'Connell brothers have gained nationwide publicity.

No Word Received
No word has been received from the kidnappers since the family inserted a code advertisement in an Albany newspaper Saturday night, naming 11 intermediaries with whom the abductors could open negotiations, it was said.

Members of the family have received three telephonic and two written communications from the kidnappers.

At 1:20 a. m. Friday, a neighbor passed the O'Connell house and saw John, Jr.'s automobile, its door open, parked at the curb. The automobile had not been there 10 minutes earlier, according to another neighbor.

Phone Call Made
At 1:30 a. m. Mrs. O'Connell, returning from a social engagement, saw the car and wondered why the door was opened. When she found her son was not home, she became alarmed and called friends.

Regarding details of the sequence which followed, Mrs. O'Connell's friends were confused. One report said the kidnappers called twice during the night asking for "Ed" and later for "Dan" O'Connell.

over, that the following day the spokesman for the abductors called Daniel V. by telephone.

According to a source close to the family, the voice said: "We've got Ed's nephew. Don't tell the police or the newspapers or we'll kill him. We'll get in touch with you later."

Later that morning the man called Daniel O'Connell again, repeating the warning and said there would be a letter addressed to Edward J. O'Connell, special delivery at the postoffice.

Police Not Called
The letter was received about 10:30 a. m. Saturday. It was reported. It merely said that a further communication would be received soon and again repeated.

"We'll kill him if you tell the police or the newspapers," it said. As far as could be learned, the police have not officially been called into the case.

About three hours later, a second written communication was received by the family, again by special delivery. The body of the letter was printed but the signature was that of young O'Connell, the United Press was told.

The letter said young O'Connell was being treated "all right" that the kidnappers demanded \$250,000, and left further instructions to obtain the youth's release.

WEED ROAD ROUTE OPTIONS PREPARED

Partial options on the three proposed entrances of the Weed-Klamath Falls highway into this city have been obtained by the county court, and will be mailed to the state highway commission at Salem, Monday night.

Although the court has been unable to reach many of the property owners along the proposed entrance routes, Judge George D. Grizzle stated that enough had been contacted to obtain an approximate idea of the prices to be asked for right-of-way or easements.

The highway commission will consider relative merits of the entrance routes early Tuesday morning at a special meeting.

WIDENING UP
SALEM, July 10 (AP)—Consideration of highway locations through two cities, possible readjustment of highway fund allocations in view of regulations received from the federal government, awarding of contracts for the widening of the Aurora-Brooks section of the Pacific highway and presentation of other matters by delegations are the scheduled events set for the state highway commission meeting in Portland tomorrow.

Chairman Leslie M. Scott of the commission, here for a brief time today, stated another conference with the bureau of public roads and the forestry department was necessary as the result of new regulations and specifications sent out by the federal government for expenditure of public works funds. It may be necessary, he said, to make changes in the allocations previously decided upon.

Consideration of new locations of state highway within Klamath Falls and Oregon City will be taken up at the meeting. Several representatives from each city will be present to argue the merits of the suggested relocations.

City Approves Work Permits
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A. Dick at 835 Main street to stop construction work as he had not applied for a building permit. Monthly reports of the fire chief, police chief and city meat and milk inspectors were read and placed on file. The police report stated 82 arrests were made during the month of June and that \$539.50 had been received from fines and forfeited bail.

Report Tells of Jimmie Mattern
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by Russian fliers at Khabarovsk, the messages indicated.

He brought his plane down in the marshy Anadyr river valley when his motor failed last month, as he sought to reach Nome, Alaska, from Khabarovsk on his world flight from New York, and was forced to live off the country until found by accident by Russian coast guardsmen.

NENANA, Alaska, July 10.—(AP)—A seaplane bearing members of the Alexander expedition, en route to Anadyr, Siberia, to bring back stranded Jimmie Mattern, round the world flier, landed here at 11:10 a. m. local time (1:10 p. m. P. S. T.).

William Alexander, Fred Fetterman, and Thomas Abbey, all of New York, and their pilot, Robert Ellis, stopped here for lunch and were to proceed immediately for Nome, where the ship will be refueled. Favorable weather was reported on their flight here from Fairbanks.

From Nome, the foursome will strike out over the Arctic to Anadyr (CQ), Siberia, where Mattern awaits them.

The New Yorkers flew in their own plane from New York to Terrace, B. C., where they were forced down a few days ago. They boarded the Southern Alaskan airways seaplane to Jueau, preferring it to their own land plane.

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had sent out a terse radio message saying they were landing "near Rockland."

The visit to this last American "port of call" reminded islanders of a similar visit two years ago this month when Colonel and Mrs. Lindbergh stopped here to say farewell to their first-born son, Charles, Jr., then 14 months old, before departing on their air tour of the Orient.

Two Blocs Meet
Attention tonight centered on the meeting of the drafting committee of the monetary commission, at which an effort will be made to reconcile the differences between the gold standard countries led by France and the non-gold standard nations led by the United States.

James M. Cox of Ohio is chairman of the drafting committee. Senator Key Pittman of Nevada is a member but the United States has only one vote. The ten countries represented are divided equally as to gold bloc and non-gold bloc affiliations.

They were named, at a crowded but unexcited session of the monetary commission, at which

Cox presided. The somber tone of the session reflected the grave atmosphere of the whole conference. Cox seemed either hurried to get the business finished or unfamiliar with the translation routine, because twice he rose to proceed while the translator stood in embarrassment, unable to begin his translation while Chairman Cox was speaking.

5th Week Opens
The fifth week's meetings began with a concerted effort led by the United States and Great Britain to keep the economic conference in full swing. Secretary Hull, addressing the steering committee, again uttered an impassioned plea for co-operation in the face of the world crisis.

Other delegates were impressed by the sincerity of the tall, scholarly American statesman, but commented he did not advance the concrete proposals expected. Hull prior to the meeting commented:

"I do not see how these statesmen will be able to go home to their starving peoples and admit they failed to achieve anything."
