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MANY SCALES IN OREGON CHECKED

SALEM, Ore., July 10 (AP)—In an attempt to protect the buying public, state agricultural inspectors constantly check weighing and measuring devices.

Scales tested in 1932 numbered 19,293, and weights examined totaled \$4,942.

Thirty-four defective weights were destroyed, and 178 scales condemned. Approximately 1,315 scales were given adjustments of a minor nature to comply with the regulations.

The entire 2,177 linear measures tested were all found to be within the legal tolerance. Some 24,375 liquid measures were examined and gauged.

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
