MEN FINED \$20 ON BOOZE LAW COUNT

NEGRO'S FAIR LADY WANTS ANNULMENT

LOS ANGELES, July 11, (UP)—A suit for annulment was brought by young Margaret Fay Desmond as the aftermath of a \$100,000 alienation of affections filed by her husband, Leo, against Dr. Eugene C. Nelson, negro physician here.

Mrs. Desmond, 28, and Virginia born, alleged her husband had described himself as an American citizen but that it developed he was a native of Ireland. By marrying him, she was deprived of her own American citizenship, the suit claimed.

She married Desmond September 23, 1929, in Long Island City, where she lived with him until recently. Speaking today of Desmond's suit, the winsome white wife denied his charges that Dr. Nelson "persuaded, abducted and enticed her" from home. "Eugene didn't know I was married so he thought he was courting a single girl."

Dr. Nelson, the divorced husband of Helen Lee Worthing, former follies girl, likewise denied he was a "love pirate" but admitted he loved Mrs. Desmond.

Pleasure Boat Goes Down; Many Lost

MATSUBAYA, Japan, July 11, (UP)—Fears were expressed today for the lives of more than a score of passengers and crew of the 52-ton pleasure motorboat Daihachi Yamato Maru, which sank with 120 persons on board during a cruise down the inland sea. Rescue workers reported 90 had been found safe on tiny islets in the inland sea after a night of searching. Several others were found during the night.

RAILROAD SALARY SLASH CONTINUED

CLEVELAND, July 11, (AP)—The railway labor executives' association announced today that all the interested railway employees had confirmed an agreement to continue the temporary 10 per cent wage reduction placed in effect February 1, 1932.

The agreement was tentatively signed in Washington last month by the labor association and railway management representatives after the administration had demanded the management from a demand for another 12 1/2 per cent reduction beginning this November.

The confirmation by the various brotherhoods and employee classes merely means that the 10 per cent reduction will be continued until June 30, 1934.
