GOODYEAR PUTS ON 6,000 MORE MEN

With the upturn in buying throughout the country producing increased orders, more and more men are going back to work. Andy Warner, local dealer for the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co., has announced.

"More than 4,000 additional workers have been re-employed in Goodyear's factories since April 1," he said. "This includes tire factories in Akron, Los Angeles and Gadsden, Ala., and cotton mills in New Bedford, Mass., and Cartersville, Cedartown and Rockmart, Ga."

"The trend of general business activity is upward, and an excess of 22 per cent over normal seasonal improvement since March has been noted in the volume of all types of business in the U. S.," he continued. "Renewal tire sales show an upturn of 80 per cent in excess of normal seasonal improvement since March. Coupled with the increase in business activity is an increase in price of all commodities, averaging 16 per cent since March."

"Increased orders are coming into Goodyear's factories and production of Goodyear tires has increased 100 per cent since January. To take care of this increased production factory employment has been stepped up 25 per cent since that time."

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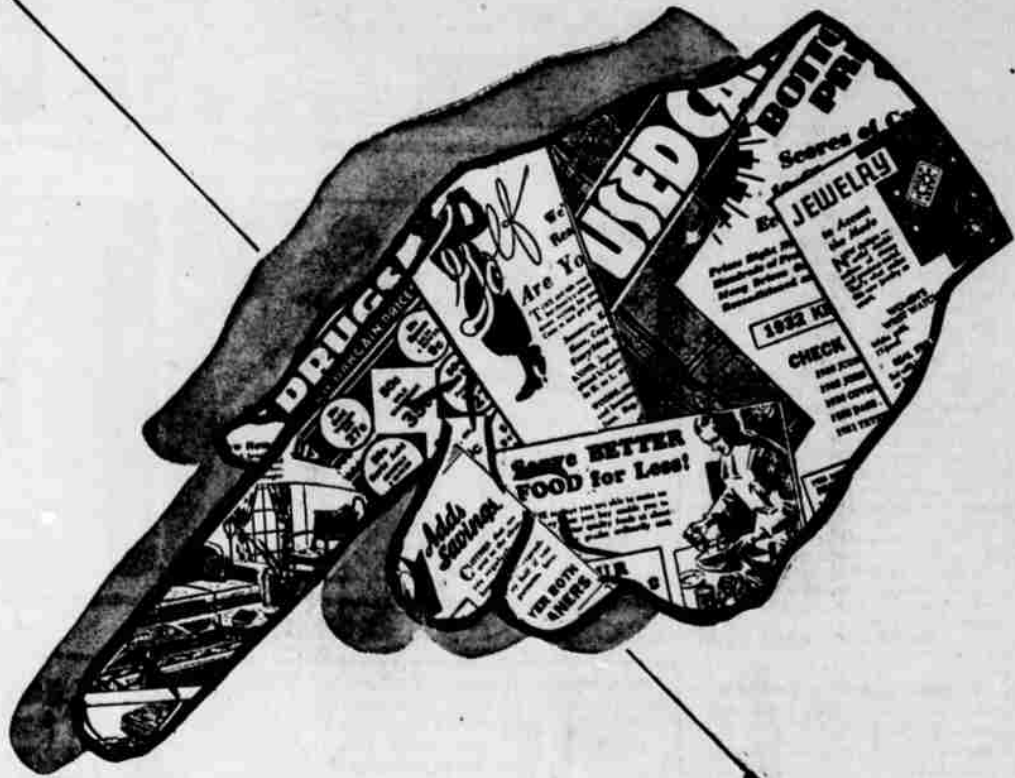
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
