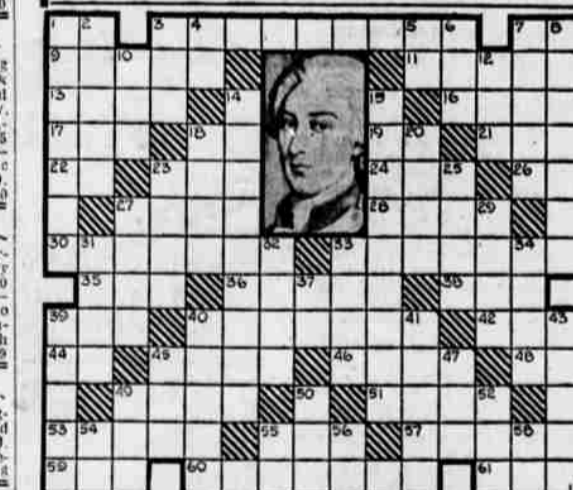

EGG INCREASE DRAWING OUT POOR STORES
PORTLAND, July 12, (AP)—Further betterment in the egg price has called forth some complications in the trade. Demand for quality goods has been sufficient to create and maintain an advance in the price during recent days with the latest rise of 1c now effective generally.
It has been the poor quality that has invited disaster in the trade. Reports suggested heavy withdrawals out of local stores. Some of this held stock was reported of very poor quality.
Latest reports suggested stocks of eggs in Pacific slope coolers are but a mere fraction above a year ago, indicating heavy withdrawals to date at all points.
Trading in the butter market continued full steady to strong and without price changes on the open market. Make was decreasing at leading Pacific slope points.
Market for hens remained sluggish in the live poultry trade but without further price change. Springers of various types were holding about steady generally.
Advance of 10c per hundred pounds in the price on all grades of refined sugar became effective during the day. The new selling price on berry and fruit is \$5.00, with special granulated \$4.85 and beet, \$4.75.
Prices reached another new high record for the season on old potatoes when Yakima stock advanced to \$2.75 here for 1 1/2, while Deschutes were nominally listed up to \$2.00 for bakers. New potatoes were a trifle earlier in spots, increasing the spread.

RYE BOOMED TO NEW HIGH ON EXCHANGE
CHICAGO, July 12, (AP)—Taking a star role, rye today aimed apparently at the zenith and scored approximately 25c a bushel advance for the last three days.
A striking feature was that for the first time some rye sold higher than some deliveries of the companion breadstuff, wheat, so high that Canadian rye is now being imported into this country. Talk was current that ownership of the limited supply of rye in the United States has been virtually concentrated in the hands of a few strong interests.
All grain closed nervous, rye, 3c to 3 1/2c above yesterday's finish; wheat, 1c to 1 1/2c down; oats, 1c to 1c off, and provisions unchanged to 30c decline.
