

KLAMATH PEOPLE HEAD FOR WILDS

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cory and Mr. and Mrs. Charles O'Brien, of Klamath Falls, are leaving Sunday for a 90-day trip into the wilds of British Columbia to take moving pictures of wild life.

O'Brien and Cory plan to establish a hunt club with lodge and headquarters in the Ootsa, White Sulphur and Tahatso lakes district, 650 miles north of the international line, in the heart

of the big game country of British Columbia. The purpose of this trip is to take motion pictures of the grizzly bear, mountain goat and sheep, moose, deer and caribou that inhabit the region. The pictures will be shown in Klamath Falls some time in November, Cory said.

Waterfowl and upland birds are found abundantly in this region, Cory said, with ducks, geese and various species of partridge predominating.

Active operation of the hunt club is planned for next year.

Timber, Mill Activity Music In Lumber Drama

BIEBER, Calif.—The crash of falling plies, the rumble of heavily-loaded trucks, the splash of logs into mill ponds, the snarl of big power-driven saws, the clatter of new-cut lumber being piled, are going to make prosperity music in Big Valley this summer and fall. Part of the orchestra is already playing. The rest is tuning up.

There will be about two hundred performers in this vicinity—lumber mill and logging workers and their employers. Their product is expected to be more than twenty million feet of lumber before next winter.

Installation of two lumber mills a short distance west of Nubieber by Davis and Bowers from Ashland, Oregon, and the Stockton Box company of Stockton, Calif., is nearing completion. Some thirty men are at work erecting mill structures, setting up machinery and generally getting things ready for operation. A "cat" shovel finished the Stockton company mill's log pond this week and moved over to the Davis and Bowers mill half a mile away to dig a pond there. H. J. Goff,

general superintendent for the Stockton Box company, and C. H. Davis and J. W. Bowers are directing activities.

Each of the two mills will be able to turn out something like 100,000 feet of lumber in an eighteen-hour day and has a program calling for production of six million feet this year. About forty men will be employed at each mill, in addition to the logging crew in the woods. The Stockton Box company will take the output of the Davis and Bowers mill as well as its own. Claude Caldwell's mill at West Bieber, now in its second season, has been running since the first of June and cutting half a million feet a week. It has an estimated million feet of timber to work on. Sam Zamboni and J. Costello are preparing to cut lumber south of Lookout Junction with a mill they moved from Davis creek this year. Anderson and Plum were to start cutting lumber this week in Little Valley, 20 miles south of Bieber. Their mill, brought in this year, can saw 100,000 feet per day, and their operation will use about seventy men.

Portland Policeman Serves As Welfare Aide, Gets Results

PORTLAND, July 13 (P)—A Portland policeman appointed himself a one-man welfare agency last night, and did he get results?

It occurred after a woman stepped to his side and asked "what time does the next freight train leave for Crescent City, Calif.?"

The woman, Mrs. Helen Rose of Vernonia, explained her situation to the surprised cop. She and her three children, aged 3, 5 and 7, planned to catch the freight train for the California trip, she said. They hitch-hiked to Forest Grove and came to Portland on a stage. They were fed there by a welfare agency but there was no way to get transportation south.

Then Patrolman Cameron swung into action. He talked to merchants near the Union station, he interviewed an express company, and conferred with Union station officials.

It was only a short time later that Mrs. Rose and her three small children were on their way to Crescent City—"riding the cushions," too, and the policeman said he believed there was enough left over to buy them enough food on the way.

Distress Message Found At Seaside

SEASIDE, Ore., July 13 (P)—Undecided whether the note was

a hoax or genuine. Seaside officials last night revealed the contents of a purported distress message found in a bottle on the beach here Monday.

"Help, we are swamped," the message read. "Been adrift since June 28 from S. S. Kingland. Last location 23 north latitude, 51 longitude. Jim Brent. Red O. Corry."

Investigators said 51 longitude would place the source of the message somewhere in the Arabian desert. Water may have obliterated a numeral, however, and 51 longitude, in the Pacific ocean, might have been meant, they observed.

LEGION OPPOSING SWITCH OF FUNDS

A resolution opposing two measures appearing upon the ballot of the special election of July 21 to divert \$48,000 known as the "armory fund," to other uses in Klamath county, was unanimously passed by the Klamath post of the American Legion in regular meeting Tuesday night.

The Legion favors immediate construction of an armory upon the grounds that members of the Legion realize the benefit of proper training for young men in defense purposes, because of a civic need for a public auditorium and because of the need of Battery "D," Klamath Falls' crack unit of the national guard, for an armory.

The Legion resolution states that if the armory fund were diverted it would be dissipated without material gain or the reduction of taxes in the county.

A similar resolution was also passed by the Veterans' Political League on July 11, opposing both measures to transfer all or part of the armory fund to other funds or purposes. The veterans also favor construction of an armory at the earliest possible date.
