

TUPPER TO FACE JURY ON MONDAY

Benjamin Tupper, Klamath Indian charged with the murder of his son-in-law, Ivan Murdock, will face the federal grand jury

In Portland on Monday, July 17, U. S. Marshal Cal G. Wells arrived in Klamath Falls Thursday to take Tupper into custody and to take him to Portland. In addition to Tupper, David W. Middleton, charged with passing counterfeit currency, and Robert Wiesner, Celsie Ruffer and Andrew W. Butte, all Indians, charged with possession and introduction of liquor into the Klamath reservation, will be taken to Portland to face the federal grand jury.

Wells will take the five Klamath prisoners to Medford where he will take three additional federal prisoners into custody and conduct them to Portland.

MOTT SUPPORTS ROOSEVELT PLAN

SALEM, July 13 (AP)—The success of the federal emergency recovery measures enacted to rehabilitate industry and re-establish prosperity over the country, hinges entirely upon the efficiency and judgment with which the acts are administered, declared Representative James Mott, congressman from the first Oregon district, who returned home from Washington last night.

"The acts confer upon the president and his administrators unlimited authority to establish wage scales, reduce working hours and fix prices and they will work out if properly administered," said Mott. "Of course the whole program is a form of government socialism but the inadequacy of the old order made it necessary that something be done."

Mott expressed complete satisfaction with most of the legislation enacted at the President Roosevelt's request.

Confidence that the Chemawa Indian school here, one of six non-reservation boarding schools designated for abandonment by executive order, will not be closed was expressed by Mott.

He said that he was assured by Director Collier of the Indian bureau just before he left Washington that the school would be maintained, although enrollment would be curtailed to some extent. The amount of reduction in enrollment will be determined by financial considerations, but Mott says he does not expect it to exceed 200 students.

Everywhere in the east, he reported, there is a feeling of optimism regarding economic conditions which, while not reflected yet in any widely apparent improvement in business, is having a promising psychological effect.

Mott plans to spend the next week filling speaking engagements that have been scheduled by him, starting at Roseburg, tomorrow, and will then go to Breitenbush Springs for a rest. Later he will make a tour of the entire first district. He does not plan to return to Washington until late in December.

"Living in Washington at this season of the year is like living continually in a Turkish bath," he said. "There is no relief from the heat, day or night."
