RESTRICTED BANKS' FATE TO BE KNOWN

SALEM, July 14 (AP)—A meeting of the state banking board will be called today or tomorrow to consider extensions or closing out of the state banks now under restricted basis. It was announced here today. The time for restricted operations ends on midnight July 15.

Several of the banks have requested extensions and it was indicated these would be granted. Three courses are open for action. Either extensions will be granted, liquidations ordered, or the banks will be opened on full basis. Most of the restricted banks will never open, it was indicated. A score of state banks are operating on restricted basis. The banking board consists of Governor Julius L. Meier, Secretary of State Hal E. Ross, State Treasurer Rufus C. Holman and A. A. Schramm, state banking superintendent as secretary. The business will probably be transacted by phone.

LUMBER CODE WILL BE GIVEN APPROVAL

LONGVIEW, Wash., July 14 (AP)—J. D. Tennant, representing the West Coast Lumbermen's association in Washington, D. C., today informed lumbermen here

that he had received assurance that the 4-L wage and hour scale incorporated in the industry's code, probably will be adopted.

"I see nothing in the administration's statement indicating that the 4-L's wage scale and working hours will not be adopted," Tennant wired lumbermen here. "The administration's reference was made to hours and wages in the lower brackets." The scale recommended by the 4-L provides a 48-hour week for

logging and 40 hours for mills with a minimum scale of 40 cents an hour for factory labor and 42 cents for other divisions.
