

COUNCIL ADOPTS NEW CIVIC BODY

LAKEVIEW, Ore. — At the meeting of the Lakeview city council held Tuesday, an ordinance was passed whereby the city is to have a new civic body, with authority to pass on all matters pertaining to the layout and extension of city streets and building zones.

This committee has been organized along the generally adopted plan in city government, and will be composed of ten members, including the mayor, city engineer, city attorney and seven members, who are to be appointed by the mayor.

This committee will make a study of the entire city layout as it now exists, with the idea of making eminent improvements in street facilities and the provision of adequate safeguards against fire hazards. This will necessitate the breaking up of long city blocks that now exist, and opening of streets which have been laid out in the plans of the city, but which have never been opened.

Plans for zoning the city residential section will be made, in order to group all of the industrial plants in one section, and do away with these unsightly structures. By so grouping the industrial plants water facilities may be more easily provided.

An ordinance adopting the uniform code of state traffic laws was adopted by the council.

HOPPER CONTROL CREWS AT WORK

LAKEVIEW, Ore. — County Agent Victor W. Johnson now has three grasshopper control crews at work to stop a number of small infestations of grasshoppers, which have shown up where the water has receded within the past few weeks.

One of these crews is located on the Chawaucan, with Taylor Metaker in charge; another is located in Drews Valley, with Jim Dyke in charge, and the other is in the Syran Valley, with Ted Emery in charge.

By establishing crews in these districts it is hoped to control the grasshopper invasion so completely that there will be no loss of forage.
