Post In Siberia Ahead Of Record; Ocean Fliers Die

Round-World Airman 10 Hours Ahead of His Old Record; Lithuanian Flight Ends In Crash Short Way From Destination

MOSCOW, Tuesday, July 18. (UP)—Wiley Post, racing against time around the world to set a new record, took off from the air-drome at Novosibirsk, Siberia, on the fifth leg of his flight at 8:55 a. m., Moscow time today (1:55 a. m., E. D. T.).

Post was bound for either Irkutsk or Chita en route to Khabarovsk on the far eastern coast of Siberia. It was raining at Irkutsk, 500 miles to the east, and the landing field there was poor, so it was believed that Post might continue to Chita before stopping for a few hours' rest. He planned to reach Khabarovsk to spend the night.

Post required 13 hours, 4 minutes for the flight from Moscow and when he arrived at Novosibirsk he was 10 hours 26 minutes ahead of the record for world flight set by Post and Harold Gatty in 1931.

When Post and Gatty arrived in Novosibirsk, using the same plane, they were 76 hours, 35 minutes ahead of the record, the starting point. When Post arrived here this morning he was only 56 hours 9 minutes out of New York.

Flier Loses Time
Post lost a little time on the Moscow-Novosibirsk flight. He was 13 hours ahead of the Post-Gatty record when he left Moscow and had hoped to make the flight in 11 hours. He was sighted twice as he flew over Siberia, at Omak and Tatarskaya.
