San Francisco Star Extends Hits to Fifty-three Games; Portland Ducks Lose Again

By The Associated Press. San Francisco's Joe De Maggio had run his consecutive game hitting record to 53 today, with Jim O'Giesby of Los Angeles still in pursuit with a 39-game mark.

They got their hits as Los Angeles won one of the three week-end games with the Seals to take the series, 4-3. Dick Ward beat San Francisco Saturday, 4-5, but he took a mauling from De Maggio, who banged out three doubles and a single.

The Indian sign Oakland holds over Portland worked as effectively last week as in the two previous meetings of the clubs this season, and the Oaks won their third straight series from the Beavers, 5-2.

Sacs, Seattle Split. Sacramento defeated Seattle 3-1 Saturday and divided Sunday's twin bill to increase its first place margin to two full games.

SOLONS SLUMP IN WARM RACE

St. Louis Blanks Leaders of American Flag Fight.

By RUGH S. FULLERTON, Jr. A. P. Sports Writer. The slump which strikes nearly every good ball club at least once a season, has hit the Washington Senators just when they seemed to have first place in the American league packed away in moth balls.

A week ago, Washington, with 23 victories in 26 games, had pulled away to a 4 1/2 game lead over the New York Yankees.

Solons Blanked. The Senators took a 7 to 0 whitewashing from the St. Louis Browns Sunday, their fifth defeat in eight games.

Irving "Bump" Hadley gave the Senators only four hits, three of them by Heinie Manush, while Earl Whitehill went up in the air in the ninth and Bill McAfee also was hit hard to give the big place club six runs.

The only other American league game saw the Cleveland Indians defeat the Boston Red Sox 2 to 1 in 14 innings when Frank Pytlak and Willie Kammnicked Bob Weiland for singles and the first place club six runs.

Giants Divide Pair. The New York Giants, National league leaders, continued their career as "hitless wonders" by dividing a pair of 1-0 decisions with the last place Cincinnati Reds although they got only 15 hits in 24 innings.

The Reds won the opener, a 15-inning duel between Red Lucas and Bud Parmelee when Rollie Hemery singled in the eighth inning to break up a mound duel between Ed Bryant and Pat Malone.

Chicago's principal rival, the Chicago Cubs and St. Louis Cardinals, also split doubleheaders while Pittsburgh was kept idle by rain at Brooklyn.

The second place Cubs dropped the opener to Boston 2-1, when Wally Berger clouted his 17th home run in the eighth inning to break up a mound duel between Ed Bryant and Pat Malone.

Bill Hallahan's flinging gave the Cards a 4-2 decision over the Phillies in the first game, but the Phils piled up eight runs in three frames to win the second, 5-2, behind Snipe Hanson's six hit hurling.

The junior chamber of commerce, sponsors of this first sailboat race on Klamath Lake, and all the others concerned, made high commendation for the manner in which the race was conducted, and for initiating a sport so well adapted to this locality.

HELL DIVER WINS KLAMATH REGATTA

By DORIS BUXTON (Herald Special Correspondent) Hell Diver, black horse of the sailboat race held on Klamath Lake Sunday, sailed triumphantly across the finish line four and a half minutes ahead of its nearest competitor, to win the first place pennant.

With a three man crew consisting of Rolland Watt and Emil Johnson, co-owners, and W. E. Lamm of Modoc Point, this Fish Class sailboat finished the four-mile course in 53 minutes, 50 seconds.

Zephyr Second. Dr. A. O. Roenicke, skipper of Zephyr, carrying 100 square feet of sail, showed splendid generalship in taking second honors away from The Wu, carrying 135 square feet of canvas and skippered by Nelson Reed.

The Zephyr crept up on The Wu's lead, gained at the start, finishing the first lap just a boat's length behind. Pointing closer on the beat to windward, Roenicke nosed out Reed to round the last buoy a slim 30 seconds to the good.

The boats, both built by Teiford, are of the same design. The Zephyr having a Maroon, and The Wu a gaff-headed rig.
