Prospects for a general agreement of reduction of wheat exports appeared dim, despite MacDonald's appeal for a solution of the grain problem. The Danubian wheat nations are expected to reach an agreement on restriction, but even if the Soviet union later joined the pact it appeared that a general agreement would be unlikely if the big four wheat producing countries—United States, Canada, Australia and Argentina—attempt to induce importing countries to lower wheat tariffs.

LAKEVIEW LUMBER MEN HEAR REPORT

LAKEVIEW, July 17 (Special)—At a meeting held here by the directors of the Lakeview Pine Lumber Manufacturers association, Forrest E. Cooper, local attorney, gave a report of the recent meeting in San Francisco at which time manufacturers of white pine and sugar pine in Nevada, California and southern Oregon organized the California White and Sugar Pine association for the purpose of having their mills recognized as a separate division of the lumber industry upon the Pacific coast. Mr. Cooper represented the local association at the San Francisco meeting.

He reported that the newly formed California association is composed of seasonal pine sawmill operators who are opposed to the code of the Western Pine association because it contains no guarantee of justice to the small sawmills, but is framed in such a manner as to make it possible for the timber owners throughout the west who have immense holdings to liquidate their investments by curtailing the production of small sawmills and thereby boosting lumber prices to where the large timber holders can afford to cut their immense stands of timber.

The members of the Lakeview Pine Manufacturers association have not yet elected to be governed by either the code of the Western Pine association or the code of the California White and Sugar Pine association. The local association has formulated its own code which local sawmill owners claim stands for a square deal to them.

In the event the national lumber code contains similar guarantees for the seasonal sawmill operator the Lakeview sawmills will undoubtedly be satisfied. However, the local association will present its own code in the event that the facts dictate such a course.

The box factory of the Crane Creek Lumber company at Willows, Modoc county, will be rebuilt just as soon as possible. The debris from the fire

is being cleared away and the new structure should be under way within the next 10 days. About 160 men were employed at the box factory at the time of the fire.

Justice of the Peace F. M. Duke, at the conclusion of a preliminary hearing held here today bound Fred Hauser, who is charged with first degree murder, because of killing Charles Junkin, over to the grand jury in a charge of second degree murder. The grand jury will be called within the next few days to investigate the case.

point to create immediate purchasing power so that the price and production advance may be stabilized and maintained. President Roosevelt stands squarely behind him.

Project Voluntary
The project is purely voluntary in character, Johnson emphasized again today.

Industry is to be asked, in a giant patriotic campaign that soon will be launched, to cooperate with the government by raising wages and shortening hours immediately pending the adoption of complete codes.

The administrator considers this the propitious time for a great "push." It comes on the heels of official inauguration today of the cotton textile code which will give new jobs, more pay and fresh hope to many thousands.

WASHINGTON, July 17. (UP)—Thousands of jobs for artisans and laborers throughout the nation were virtually assured tonight as Secretary of Interior Ickes announced the details of the initial \$64,435,188 allotment of public works funds for federal projects.

The projects ranged in size from the \$300 chicken coop and insect trap to be built for the agriculture department at Uvalde, Texas, home of Vice President Garner, to \$35,000,000 for the interior department's reclamation project at Boulder dam.

tleman and the perfect guest despite the fatigue brought on by days of these activities, remained uncertain about the exact return route or the exact time of departure.

Tentative plans are for the planes to leave Chicago's lake front Wednesday morning and follow the Lakes-Canal route to New York for a visit that may last as long as nine days and include a side trip to Washington to see President Roosevelt.

If these plans are made permanent, the fleet will fly from New York back to Italy by a more southern route than that which it followed in bringing the greeting of Mussolini to a Century of Progress.

This proposed route would be by Newfoundland and the Azores, thence to the Italian base at Orbetello, Italy, which the armada left June 30.
