AIR CONDITIONING METHODS REVEALED

The first demonstration of electric air conditioning equipment ever held in this city opened Tuesday. This novel demonstration, which is conducted by Raymond Gill, commercial engineer for the Frigidaire corporation and D. A. ROAD IN ROCKIES OFFICIALLY OPEN

GLACIER PARK, Mont., July 18.—The spectacular Going-to-the-Sun highway, said to be the most scenic mountain road in America, was officially opened today.

Dedictory exercises were held at Logan Pass, on the summit of the Rockies, under the auspices of the national park service, and the big red "fire wagons," as the Indians call the sight-seeing busses, began their scheduled runs over the breath-taking trail that bridges the saw-toothed continental divide between the east and west entrances to the park.

Began in 1911 and for the most part laboriously carved from precipitous mountain cliffs, the 52-mile highway has cost the government \$2,500,000. It is the first motor road to conquer the rugged interior of the Blackfeet's "Land of the Shining Mountains."

The new road makes it possible for even hurried travelers on transcontinental trips to declare a one-day vacation and detour by motor bus over the new route between Belton and Glacier Park station, the two entrances to the park, both on the main line of the Great Northern Railway.

Brew Plant At Medford Nearly Ready For Work

Louis Polla, who has just returned from Medford, reports that the new Southern Oregon Brewing company plant there will be in operation about August 10. The new brewery will have a capacity of about 75 barrels a day. Louis P. Kopples, who won first prize for his beer at the San Francisco exposition in 1915, will be brewmaster of the new plant. The product will be marketed largely in southern Oregon and northern California.

HEAVY SNOWS STILL BLOCK CRATER RIM

The rim road around Crater Lake is not expected to be cleared of snow drifts until August 1, according to D. S. Libby, park naturalist who was in Klamath Falls Tuesday.

"Perhaps one of the greatest snow drifts the park has ever known was made during the May snow storm," Libby said. "Snow at that time piled nearly 80 feet high along the north face of the Watchman on the west side of the rim road."

Libby estimated approximately 40 feet of the drift still existed. Snow plows and road crews are working on the west side of the rim but do not expect to have the passage cleared for several weeks.

The east entrance to the lake and the east section of the rim road are open. The rim is open to within two miles of the Wineglass.

Many sportsmen and visitors have inquired at the chamber of commerce in the past few days about the Wineglass road. It is a popular fishing spot of the lake.

Several groups of scientist classes from various parts of the United States have started tours through the park.

Last week-end Dr. Fry with 20 students from the University of Washington constructed a camp in the park and spent three days on geological surveys.

July 26 and 27, the coast to coast omnibus tour, composed of approximately 190 teachers and scientist instructors will visit the park, Libby stated.

Bread Prices Up In Klamath Falls

Bread prices at all stores and bakeries raised Monday morning in compliance with agreement of the newly organized Klamath County Bakers association working with the industrial recovery act.

Prices in effect since Monday morning are: one pound loaf, seven cents wholesale, nine cents retail. One and one-half pound loaves, 10 1/2 cents wholesale and 13 cents retail.

Gov. John Pollard of Virginia, has announced he will recommend a substantial decrease in automobile license taxes, and an increase of two cents in the gasoline tax for road building and maintenance.
