## FOUR MEN CLEARED IN GAMBLING CASE

**CHILQUIN, July 15**—In the justice of peace court here this afternoon, two Indians and two whites, one an officer, were found not guilty of charges brought against them by the only Indian superintendent of reservations in the United States, Wade Crawford, a member of the Klamath tribe, who has openly announced a general clean-up campaign on the reservation. Howard Cramblitt and Jesse Wright, Indians, and Clarence Ohles and Constable George Flurry were charged with gambling in a Chilquin pool room. Damon Savage, owner of the pool room, was also cleared on a charge of permitting gambling in his reservation business house. Upon writing to the secretary of the interior concerning such action on the reservation, Crawford was referred to the United States district attorney at Portland who later referred him to District Attorney T. R. Gillenwaters, according to reports. Gillenwaters conducted the prosecution against the defendants.

## AQUATIC MEET SET FOR FRIDAY

An aquatic meet under the auspices of the city recreation committee will be held on Friday evening at 7:30 o'clock in the new natatorium.

A program of diving, swimming races, life-saving and comedy acts will be given. Many of the children participating in the recreation program will enter, but the events are not confined to these. ## RETIRED GENERAL PASSES IN SOUTH

**SAN FRANCISCO, July 18, (AP)**—Major General Charles G. Morton, U. S. A., retired, 72, former commander of the ninth corps area, and veteran of three wars, died here early today from blood poisoning resulting from a fourth of July firecracker burn. General Morton was rushed to the Letterman General hospital from his home near Saratoga last night. He was slightly burned last July 4th while entertaining the small niece of his housekeeper, blood poisoning setting in.
