Four teams will share the Fairgrounds Sunday afternoon in one of the outstanding double header baseball events of the season.

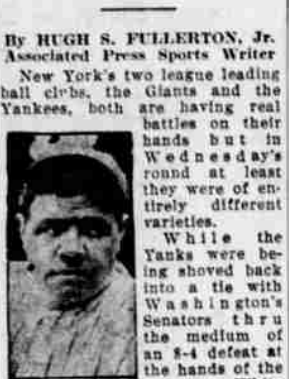

Both teams collected 14 hits apiece in the free-hitting tussle, but the Senators bunched their blows off Bruce Cunningham for a winning run total. It was Cunningham's debut in a Seal uniform.

BIRDS FEAST ON DEAD FISH

Strange Malady Brings Death to Link River Chubs, Suckers
Food like manna from heaven was bestowed upon the pelican population of Link River and Lake Ewauna Wednesday, when a strange malady attacked thousands of chubs and suckers and herds of pelicans moved in to devour the carrion.

Upwards of a thousand birds alighted near Link River bridge about 8:30 Wednesday morning and local photographers were all agog. Cameras were dragged out, lenses polished, and the big birds were "shot" from every angle.

What caused the strange and sudden epidemic among the fish remains a mystery. Some authorities believe they died because of a poisonous gas in the water or from a lack of oxygen.
