Four wets and four dries in this county seek election. Four candidates will be named. The city hall and courthouse will be closed Friday. The polls will open at 8:00 a. m. and close at 8:00 p. m.

REPEAL ALMOST ASSURED.
PORTLAND, Ore., July 20. (AP)—Wet leaders today predicted a repeal vote of two to one in Friday's voting on repeal of national state prohibition in Oregon. Those heading anti-liquor organizations seemed agreed that they had no more than "a fighting chance" in the balloting.

A comparatively light vote was forecast. Registration was about 10 per cent less than for the general election last November.

Farley Sends Note.
Some prohibition leaders said privately they would consider it a "victory" if Friday's wet majority is no greater than last November when repeal of the state prohibition enforcing laws carried 206,919 to 138,775. The repeal of the enforcing acts left only "constitutional" prohibition in the Oregon statutes, ineffective without enforcing measures. Prohibition headquarters reserved comment on a telegram from James A. Farley, democratic national chairman, that "it is highly essential that Oregon votes overwhelmingly in favor of repeal this week." The message was addressed to Oregon conferees.

Confusion Feared.
Anti-prohibition leaders said their only worry was that the voters might be confused by the phraseology on the ballot. To vote against the 18th amendment a voter must mark his ticket in favor of the 21st, or repealing amendment.

In addition to balloting directly on the 21st amendment, Oregon voters will elect 116 delegates to repeal. These delegates will have no discretion at the convention, each having pledged himself to vote in the assembly as his county voted in the election.

Mrs. Ada Jolley, state president of the W. C. T. U., said "The work of temperance education must go on. The liquor problem cannot be settled by repeal. The drink traffic must be destroyed."

Utilities Billed For Tax Payment
Bills were mailed to four privately owned utilities companies in Klamath Falls Thursday from the office of Clifton Richmond, police judge. The payments will be due August 1 under the city ordinance requiring a gross earnings tax.

The California-Oregon Power company, Postal Telegraph and Western Union will make second half payments on the 4 per cent levy for 1932 earnings. The telephone company, making a complete payment last spring, 2 per cent on gross earnings for 1931, will remit 2 per cent of the gross earnings for 1932 on August 1. The telephone company's 2 per cent will be the complete payment on 1932.

This has been the first year Western Union, Postal and Copco firms have paid a 4 per cent levy. In following years their tax on gross earnings will be 2 per cent. The amounts to be collected August 1 will be:

Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, \$1,910.30, complete 2 per cent for 1932; Copco \$10,254.49, second half of 4 per cent on 1931; Postal, \$26.33, second half of 4 per cent on 1931 from September 1 to December 31, the months of the present ownership; Western Union, \$71.34, second half of 4 per cent for 1932.

Valencia. "The woman was unconscious."

"Bustamante next drew a gun and ordered everybody to get a blank paper, which he said would be a pledge of secrecy. There were 20 or 25 people at the meeting. He carried Mrs. Navarro to an automobile and made everybody accompany him to Jersey Island. There, he ordered Leon Kintanilla (one of the defendants) to have a grave dug, and told all the women to go to the grave."

Mrs. Valencia gave such a dramatic recital of events that when she used Wilbur Pierce, defense attorney, to illustrate the manner in which Bustamante allegedly choked Mrs. Navarro, she nearly threw him to the floor of the courtroom.

Mrs. Twason gave substantially the same testimony, adding that Bustamante remarked, "she is dead," after he dropped Mrs. Navarro to the floor.

Bustamante previously had denied accusations that he choked the woman or in any other manner was responsible for her death.

At the conclusion of testimony by the star defense witnesses, the trial, ending its third week, was recessed until Monday.

officially closed to public travel, light cars are allowed provided right of way is given to contractor's trucks.

As soon as surfacing operations are completed the entire 28 miles will be treated with an oil surfacing, making one of the finest hard-surfaced roads in the northwestern part of the state. It is expected that approval will shortly be secured to extend the highway construction further north to the north boundary of the Modoc forest. If this is done there will be a paved highway almost the entire distance from this place to Klamath Falls, connecting the main Pacific highways with the Yellowstone cutoff.
