

SKIPWORTH GRANTS BANKS MORE TIME

Circuit Judge G. F. Skipworth of Lane county, in Klamath Falls preparing for the ballot theft trial of Earl H. Pehl, Jackson county judge, which opens here Monday morning, announced today that he had granted Llewellyn A. Banks, convicted slayer of Constable George Prescott of Medford, 30 days additional time to present a bill of exceptions.

Banks is held in the Lane county jail following conviction of second degree murder which grew from the Jackson ballot theft case. Today was the final date for filing the bill of exceptions.

George W. Nielson, deputy district attorney of Jackson county, and Mr. Looker, assistants to Assistant Attorney General Ralph Moody, arrived in Klamath Falls this afternoon with additional records and files for the trial.

The truck load of exhibits, consisting of recovered ballot boxes and various other items, scheduled to be sent here today from Medford will not arrive until Saturday, according to state police officers with whom the records and exhibits will be entrusted. The change was due to the legal holiday for county officials.

Approximately 20 of the state witnesses are expected to arrive Saturday and Sunday from Medford, Moody stated Friday afternoon.

Moody and his staff will maintain office in the district attorney's office while trying the Jackson county case. Office will also be maintained in rooms 422, 423 and 424 of the Willard hotel, he announced this afternoon.

T. R. Gillenwaters, district attorney of Klamath county, will sit in on the trial at Moody's request, the assistant attorney general stated.

MEDFORD, July 21. (AP)—Attorneys for Gordon L. Schermerhorn, former sheriff who was convicted Sunday of complicity in the ballot theft case here, late yesterday filed motion for a new trial.

The lawyers alleged the jury was drawn in an illegal manner, that evidence was insufficient to warrant a conviction, that the verdict was contrary to law and that certain jurors had expressed the opinion before they were drawn as jurors, that Schermerhorn was guilty.

CITY SANITATION WORK PROGRESSES

Milk and meat sanitation in Klamath Falls have been had in the past, but are improving rapidly, and will soon be equal to any in Oregon. Dairies, slaughter houses and butcher shops are cooperating actively with the city inspection service and showing a fine spirit.

Such, in brief, was the message brought to the Rotary club on Friday by Dr. C. H. Hartman, city milk and meat inspector, who was the principal speaker on the Rotary program.

Milk inspection, Dr. Hartman explained, starts with the dairy, where the strictest sanitation is enforced in order to prevent contamination. Animals must be free from infection, premises and utensils must be rigidly clean and all milk handlers must have health certificates. Inspection

work is completed in the laboratory.

The same principles, he added, apply to meat inspection, which starts in the slaughter house and follows through to the butcher shop. The purpose, in each case, he said, is to insure safe food to the consumer. Each step in the process of inspection, he added, seems a little thing in itself, but each is important in securing clean and safe food.

"We have a good ordinance here," he said, "and my job is to enforce it. I can assure you that I'm going to do that, without fear or favor. And I want to add that while I met with some opposition at first from producers who didn't fully understand the purpose of inspection, I'm getting fine co-operation now."

E. B. Hall was program chairman for the day, introducing the speaker. Mr. Hall is chairman of the citizens' board of health, recently appointed by the mayor.

Paul Landry, telling of plans for the state convention of the American Legion next month, exhibited specimens of the souvenir cans, with pelican heads, wood
