

BIG NATIONAL WAGE RAISING DRIVE READY

In reply to wired request from Hugh S. Johnson, administrator of the national recovery administration, the chamber of commerce sent a telegram Friday afternoon giving assurance that a campaign committee to direct educational and organization work, a part of the national movement to speed prosperity, would be formed immediately in this city.

WASHINGTON, July 21. (AP)—Hugh S. Johnson, recovery administrator, set swiftly in motion today the nationwide campaign to swing every employer into the wage raising movement. He telegraphed to chamber of commerce presidents in all cities of over ten thousand, asking them

to create local committees which will run the community end of the reemployment drive.

Roosevelt Alert
While Johnson acted, President Roosevelt kept close watch on the movement, alert for public reaction to the program he approved only last night. Meantime, deputies pushed ahead hearings on four separate industries which have stepped forward with codes for self regulation and labor betterment. These were the shipbuilding, lumber, electrical manufacturing and women's cloak and suit industries.

Better Wages Asked
Labor's demands for better wage and hour terms than offered by the employers dominated the proceedings.

Simultaneously the presses at the government printing office were roaring away on production of millions of copies of the president's emergency reemployment agreements, which employers, beginning the middle of next week, will be asked to sign.

Mail carriers were instructed to deliver the blanks to every business establishment employing more than two persons.

Johnson asked the president of the chambers to get on the local committee their mayor and official heads of the clearing

house, Rotary, Kiwanis and Lions clubs, retail merchants' associations, Federation of Labor, advertising clubs, federation of women's clubs, welfare societies, ministerial associations, real estate associations and other important units.

Leaders Selected
The campaign in general will be under supervision of Charles F. Horner, Kansas City, wartime head of the liberty loan drive speakers bureau.

Frank R. Wilson of Sioux City, Iowa, Louis J. Albert of Cleveland and Albert St. Clair of New York, all specialists in the liberty loan movement, have been assigned key positions in the new setup.

FIRE THREATENS HEIGHTS HOUSES

Houses on Lindley Heights were threatened Friday by a grass fire which roared up over the hill from Lewis street shortly after noon.

The fire had covered more than 20 acres at 2:30 o'clock and had flared up again around the George R. Lindley house after the fire department and residents of the heights had once brought it under control.

Hoses Hauled Out
Everyone on the hill who had a hose and a water bucket was hard at work checking the blaze. Mrs. Lindley and an elderly woman tackled the fire behind the Lindley home with a garden hose and a wet mop after the wind whipped up the blaze following the departure of the fire department booster truck.

More than a dozen houses might have been destroyed had not the big fire been brought under control. The flames licked up to several of the houses. Little actual damage was done.

The fire department received the first call at 12:14 o'clock. The booster truck crew fought the flames two hours, checking the fire.

Another grass fire near Portland street was put out after 1:33 o'clock.

Dirk De Jonge, communist candidate for mayor here at the November election, is said to be the moving spirit behind the new onslaught on the state capital.

A pamphlet was being circulated here declaring that the "march" is being organized under the direction of the Oregon State Unemployed councils and leadership of De Jonge.

"Demands" will be presented August 15. Preliminary meetings are planned in Salem, August 13 and 14 to formulate these "demands."

GREEN DENOUNCES LUMBER WAGE CODE

WASHINGTON, July 21. (AP)—William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, today denounced the wage code proposed by the lumber industry as insufficient.

"The wages imposed in this code do not conform with the spirit or letter of the recovery act," he protested at the hearing on the code.

Hours Held Too Long

"The lumber industry must organize and the law permits it to organize and as a result receive a decent price for its product so that it can pay a decent wage and put its hours of work at a point at which it can absorb its idle workers."

Wages proposed by the code range from \$19.50 in the south to \$20.40 per week in the northwest, with hours from 40 to 45.

Green objected that such wages would not provide the purchasing power which is the purpose of the law and contended the hours were much too long.

PORTLAND STORES ACCEPT CLOSING

PORTLAND, July 21. (AP)—A code which proposes to close Portland grocery stores on Sundays and holidays and regulate hours of operation from 7:30 a. m. to 6:30 p. m., was adopted at a meeting here last night of the grocers' and merchants' association. This organization membership does not include chain stores or similar non-delivery units.

The minimum wage for women was set at \$15 a week or \$2.50 a day. The maximum working week will be 48 hours, and a maximum of 5 hours a day was established.

HOBOS KILLED

GLADWIN, Iowa, July 21. (UP)—Three unidentified hobos were burned to death today when 25 freight cars, most of them filled with oil exploded and burned. The fire destroyed the Chicago & Milwaukee railroad station and the Allensworth store. A tank car left the track, crashed into a field and exploded, firing the other cars.

NEW BEER PARLOR TO OPEN TONIGHT

SALEM, July 21. (AP)—The state emergency board voted unanimously here yesterday to authorize Utilities Commissioner C. M. Thomas to expend \$27,500 in excess of his legislative appropriation during 1933.

The added expenditure will be for rate and charges investigations and will be assessed against all the utilities of Oregon, based on their gross revenues, as provided by a new legislative act.
