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Wheat Curb Fails To Meet Approval
LONDON, July 21. (P)—Stanley M. Bruce, Australian delegate, told the world economic conference today that his country certainly would not associate itself with any scheme for the restriction of wheat production as a solution for world difficulties.
"Australia has not at this moment subscribed to any such scheme," Bruce declared.
This declaration appeared to make more remote the chances for conclusion of an agreement which has been sought by representatives of the United States, Canada, Argentina and Australia.

BUTTER TRADE STILL STRONG AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, July 21. (P)—Strength of the butter trade was suggested in operations on the open market for both prints and cubes. The late cut in the price on first cubes was not suggested on the open market, where all scores were held firm. Irrespective of the price shown on the produce exchange.
Premiums over the exchange price list continued to be offered and paid for cubes on the open market, while under normal conditions the price on the open market was 1c per lb. below the exchange list.
Butterfat continued firm. Market for eggs showed general steadiness locally for top grade stuff during the day, but some weakness was suggested in spots for storage and under-grades. Much storage stock was being offered as fresh goods.

CHICAGO, July 21. (P)—Demand was good for cash wheat, mainly from millers, with prices 1c to 1c higher than yesterday.

PINE ASSOCIATION REPORTS ON TRADE

PORTLAND, July 21. (P)—New business totaling \$1,656,000 feet, or about 22 per cent under the three-year weekly average for July, was reported today by the Western Pine Association for the week ending July 15. The total was about 5 per cent less than for the previous week. Of 117 reporting member mills, 78 were in operation.

Shipments for the week were 54,825,000 feet, and production 49,685,000 feet, putting production at 35.7 per cent of mill capacity, compared with 25 per cent for the previous week, and 16.4 per cent for the year to date. Current orders were 30 per cent of capacity.

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
