GRAIN TRADING PREVENTED ON LEADING MARKETS

For the second successive day today futures trading in grain at the Chicago and Kansas City boards was barred. The suspension action followed a spectacular decline of stock prices on the New York stock exchange in a 592.570 share day that brought back memories of 1929.

The decision to suspend trading for another day was reached by directors of the Chicago board after a five-hour conference. Peter B. Carey, president, said it was requested by other exchanges to give clerical staffs opportunity to catch up with the huge volume of earlier in the week business.

Kansas City soon followed with similar action and announcements of other suspension were expected before the opening hour today. Two-hour trading in cotton and securities was permitted in Chicago today and both there and Kansas City 15-minute periods were set aside for the holders of weekly privileges.

FARM MEASURE NOW IN FORCE

A letter just received by the county agent from W. E. Upshaw, field representative, division of market enforcement, state department of agriculture, Salem, states that the produce dealers' and peddlers' act passed by the last legislature is now enforceable. Judge Crawford's decision just handed down shows this act to be valid in every respect. This letter has been received and filed in the office of the county agent.

Under this act, which is now in effect, it is unlawful for anyone other than the grower to peddle fruits and vegetables without having a license. Growers may obtain a license and identification card upon payment of one dollar, if they so desire. Unlicensed growers must carry a manifest to show to any inspector or other official. For those who are not growers, the license fees are as follows: the retail peddler hauling less than one ton \$25.00; retail peddler hauling more than one ton, \$50.00; wholesale peddler hauling less than one ton, \$50.00; wholesale peddler hauling more than one ton, \$100.00. The above rates apply to anyone peddling fruits or vegetables at wholesale or in truck market or at retail to consumers direct. Application blanks are obtainable from the state department of agriculture, Salem, or from any state inspector. Any inquiries relative to this act should be addressed to the division of market enforcement, Salem, Ore.
