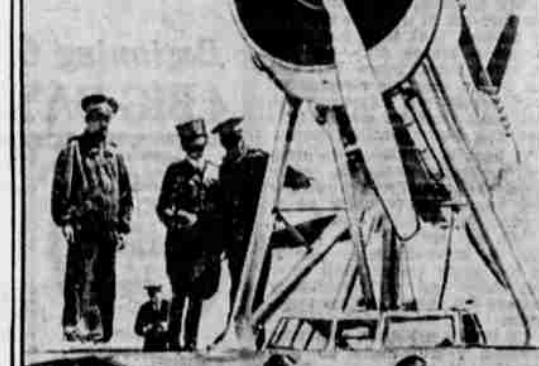

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OREGON FLAX MAY BE SENT TO EAST

SALEM, July 24 (AP)—William Elzing, secretary of the state board of control, will leave for New York within the next 10 days to contact buyers to move about \$75,000 worth of flax on hand at the state penitentiary. Expenses for his trip were tentatively approved by two members of the board here today. Governor Julius L. Meier and Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer.

Elzing said it would require about three weeks to make the trip and he was confident he could dispose of the entire amount at good prices. Approval of Hal E. Hove in sending Elzing east was indicated.

National, Local Markets

WHEAT CLOSES STEADILY ON CHICAGO MART

CHICAGO, July 24 (AP)—Suspension of a big speculative, whose dealings aggregated millions of bushels, divided interest today with reopening of grain business and temporary sharp advances in prices.
Despite active commission house purchasing which at time boosted values 3c a bushel, the wheat market reacted later, and closed at the lowest quotations allowed under emergency rules.
Large scale offerings due mostly to weakened marginal accounts did much to curtail price gains as the day drew to an end, especially as most traders were apparently disposed to adopt an attitude of caution pending outcome of a national conference of grain trade representatives in session at Washington.
Provisions reflected the weakness of hog values and of corn. In much of the day's business, the climbs in the provision markets amounted to 75c, compared with Thursday's highs.
Wheat closed steady at the average of the closing prices of Thursday, with corn unchanged to 1 1/2c up; oats, unchanged to 1 1/2c higher; rye unchanged to 1c advance, and provisions 50c to 75c off.

STATE RECEIVES HIGHWAY ROUTES

LAKEVIEW, July 21.—Negotiations by the state highway commission for the right of way of the new ten mile stretch of the Fremont highway are proceeding in a satisfactory manner. The first three miles immediately north of the city have been donated by the Favell-Ulley Realty company. Other land owners including Lake county have given an additional mile. Negotiations have been completed with all but two property owners. The state highway commission expects to let a contract for grading, graveling and oiling the ten mile stretch of highway within the next fifteen days.

Motorists have been reporting bands of Antelope along the Burns-Lakeview highway the last few days. The Lake county chamber of commerce expects to erect notices along the route urging motorists to keep a watch for the fleet footed animals.
