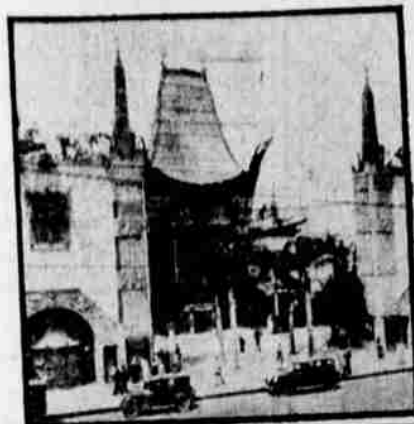
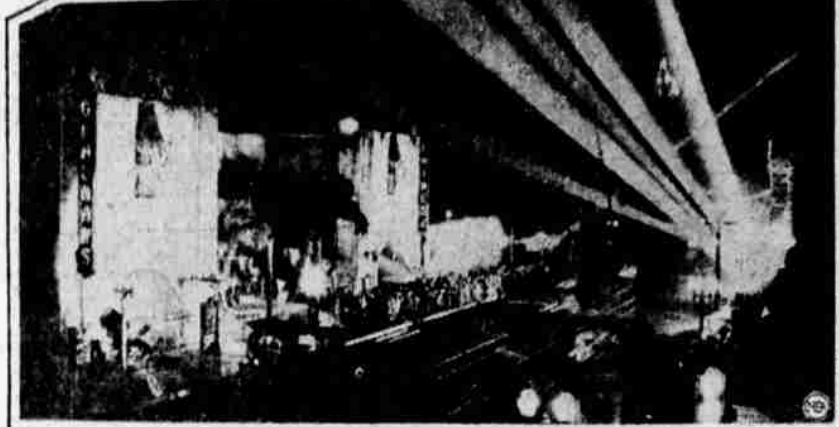


Interesting Pictorial Highlights from Here and There

Aiding Recovery Act Campaign



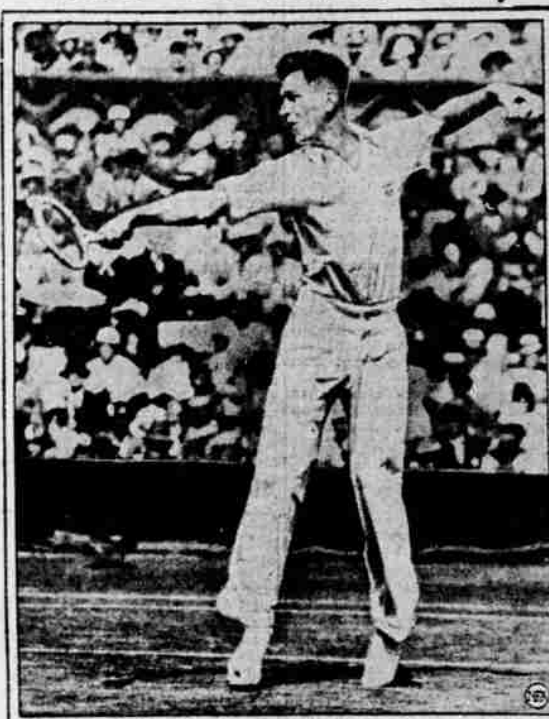
