LEGION PLANS GREAT PARADE FOR AUG. 10

What is expected to be the most brilliant parade ever to march on Klamath streets, is the American Legion annual state convention march at 9 o'clock the evening of August 10. Seven fraternal and civic organizations of the city, in addition to American Legion entries and 15 commercial entries for the grand parade, were listed Tuesday. More floats and fraternal stunts or drill team entries are expected before the opening night.

In numerous gay colored uniforms, 18 bands and drum corps from cities throughout Oregon will furnish a bountiful supply of music for the line of march, expected to last for two hours.

Stunts Arranged
Mixed with the marching of drum corps, drill teams and colorful floats will be stunts sponsored by certain groups or business houses. The Lorenz company, one of the commercial house entries, is booked for a perfect showing of how Paul Bunyan, the famous fictitious woodsman of unknown strength, would act while at the legion convention. Floats will be placed along the streets of the city for the line of march. The night parade, believed to be the first ever sponsored at a state legion convention, will cover a course of about 20 blocks. The entries will form in a double column on Klamath avenue from First street north. The march will continue up Klamath avenue to Eleventh street, cross to Main and move down Main street to Second street.

The city will have three musical organizations in the gala parade, the Sea Scout drum corps, the American Legion drum corps and the city band will lead the way.

The parade committee has asked the business people and organizations of the city to make reservations for entries in the parade.

STATE MINERS SPREAD OVER GOLD FIELDS

SALEM, Ore., July 25. (AP)—The United States may be off the gold standard, but that doesn't worry Oregon miners, who are showing more activity than for many years, milling and molting in an effort to make the earth give up her hoardings.

Report of the state engineer shows that during the first half of this year 53 water permits, aggregating \$25,252 second feet, were issued to individuals and corporations for mining purposes in Oregon. Number of other permits were issued and later cancelled.

A second foot of water calls for use of approximately 27,200 gallons per hour. New permits issued this year would result in more than 14,307,200 gallons of water taken from Oregon streams for mining each hour.

Water is used for washing sand and gravel in sluice boxes, leaving gold particles in the bottom. It is also used in placer mining, pumped with great force against banks of gold-bearing sand or gravel. Most permits issued have been for 2.0 second feet, though a number have been much larger.

Revival of gold mining in Oregon is attributed largely to unemployment, which has made men eager to find any kind of work, even if returns may be small. Operating costs have also declined, making it possible to work with some profit where gold deposits are of very low per cent.

Greatest activity, the permits issued indicate, is in southwestern and northeastern Oregon. Permits in Josephine county total 197.23 second feet. Union county's come to 109. Grant 94. Douglas 72. Total water filings from other counties included Wheeler 20, Baker 13, Coos 10, Jackson 6, Curry 3, Malheur 5.

Largest water permits issued by the state engineer was to A. B. Carter, Portland, for 125 second feet from five tributaries of Rogue river in Josephine county. Second largest was to John J. Dann, La Grande, 92.5 second feet from four tributaries of Grande Ronde river in Union county.

Other large permits issued during the six months were to Two Jacks Mining company, 20 second feet from Rock creek in Wheeler county; S. B. Herman, 10 second feet from Johnson creek in Coos county; Fred Walker, 23 second feet from three tributaries of Cow creek in Douglas county.

N. W. Cole, Grants Pass, 12 second feet from Granite creek in Josephine; James C. Garfield, Arizola, 50 second feet from Stavehead creek in Douglas; E. E. Young, Wonder, 30 second feet from Secret creek in Josephine; George H. Thomas, John Day, 48 second feet from John Day river in Grant; C. L. Rudlick, Canyon City, 30 second feet from four tributaries of John Day river in Grant.

Total number of water permits for all purposes issued thus far this year is 197. Aside from mining, most of the water appropriated is for irrigation. Fire protection, municipal and domestic stock and city, duck and frog ponds are among other uses listed.
