KLAMATH BOYS IN WOODS GET PAY INCREASE

CLIFF CREEK CAMP, Silver Lake, Ore.—Pursuant to directions from the president and under regulations to be issued by director emergency conservation work, and in accordance with definite grades to be defined by him, for the purpose of rewarding outstanding leadership, it is hereby ordered, effective July 1, 1933, that not more than five per centum of the authorized strength of any C. C. C. company may be paid a cash allowance of \$45 per month, and not more than an additional eight per centum a cash allowance of \$35 per month.

Raise in Pay
The foregoing is an extract from a letter received at the Cliff Creek C. C. C. camp from headquarters of the ninth corps area in San Francisco. In this camp all raises in pay were confined to the cooks, assistant leaders of the work gauge, the canteen steward and the company clerk.

Klamath Falls recruits who received raises were Glen McWhitty, 145, second foreman of land clearing crew; Wally Hector, 145, chief surveyor for a drift fence project; Jim Whitlatch, 136, second foreman of bridge and culvert crew; Harlan Biehn and Dan Blackmer, 136, assistant leaders of a road building and maintenance crew.

Crews Transferred
Seven new recruits arrived here last Saturday from Klamath Falls. They are Lloyd Gathwright, Robert Eaton, Walter Mallory, Bennett F. Gordon, Willard Grove, C. S. Johnson and C. C. McNeely. With the exception of Eaton and Johnson, the men are signed up as carpenters.

Saturday, July 22, 58 men were transferred to a new camp at Skookum Springs near Chemult. Two crews, one to cut telephone, fence and cattle guard poles, and a road crew will comprise the majority of the camp. Three cooks were sent from here. The new camp will be commanded by First Lieutenant Orrin J. Mishaud, formerly of this camp.

Trucks Given Camp
Eight C. C. C. Chevrolet trucks have been furnished this camp. They were driven from Portland to this camp by a specified detail consisting of Charles Dean, Bert Lee, Oscar Gunderson and Carl Darnell of Klamath Falls and three youths from Portland and Tillamook. When the camp was first established the only transportation was furnished occasionally by the forest service, which later loaned one truck to the camp.

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TOKYO DARK FIRST TIME IN HISTORY

TOKYO, July 26 (U.S.)—The "Ginza," Tokyo's far-famed central shopping district, was plunged in darkness last night in rehearsal for the air defense maneuvers to be carried out during four days from August 9 in Tokyo city and prefecture and the four surrounding prefectures, Kanagawa, Saitama, Ibaragi and Chiba.

Ginza street, often called the Fifth Avenue of Tokyo, always is filled with crowds who parade at night under the brilliance of thousands of Neon and other electric lights. On summer evenings the crowds are usually densest, mostly young men and girls out for a stroll.

Last night they saw the lights quenched for the first time in the history of the district. It had something of the weird effect of an eclipse of the sun, and the crowds were greater than ever before in the center of Tokyo's night life. All traffic was stopped, however, and taxis, buses and street cars were at a standstill when the signal was given that the "enemy" planes were approaching. The period of darkness was from 8 p. m. to 11 p. m.

Army reservists, young men's associations, young men's training schools, and other youths' and patriotic organizations were mobilized to "defend" the darkened part of the city, under command of President Shinkawa of the assembly of Kiyonashi ward, in which Ginza is situated.

The air defense maneuvers proper, from August 9 to 12, will be held in a circular area approximately 200 miles in diameter, with Tokyo at its center, and including Tokyo bay, Kanagawa and Chiba prefectures lie on the western and eastern sides of the bay, respectively, and the former contains Yokohama and the Yokosuka naval base, just inside the entrance of the bay and one of the most jealously guarded places in the empire. In Chiba is situated the Choshi wireless station, which maintains radio communication with trans-Pacific liners.

Raid Defense Planned
The maneuvers will be conducted as if an air raid were being made on Tokyo, the heart of the empire and its seaport, Yokohama, by a fleet of enemy airplanes, and the objective will be to repel the invaders by all the army and navy resources of the district, especially airplanes and anti-aircraft guns and other equipment, and aided by numerous

In an attempt to exterminate the mosquito menace which has become increasingly bothersome, oil has been poured on the ponds and streams around the camp.

The refrigeration problem has been solved by the erection of a 12 foot by 12 foot screen building beside Silver creek, near the kitchen. A sunken board trough was built across the earth floor and the course of the icy cold stream diverted to run through the building.

The junior chamber of commerce board of directors at a meeting Tuesday evening voted to co-operate and assist the American Legion in the Upper Klamath lake regatta, to be sponsored during the state convention here August 10, 11, 12.

The junior chamber city band committee, which sponsored a campaign to raise funds for concerts, reported a total of \$140 had been raised. More is expected to be pledged later, the committee reported.

Plans for the float to be entered in the Legion parade, August 19, were discussed.

It is understood that some 50 seaplanes, including bombers and fighting planes, will form the attacking force. The defense

force is planned to consist of 30 army planes, assisted by 32 anti-aircraft guns, 23 aircraft detectors, and 23 searchlights placed at strategic points throughout the five prefectures.

Lieutenant-General Hayashi, commander of the Tokyo garrison, will be general in command, with the collaboration of Admiral Nomura, commandant of the Yokosuka naval station.

These air defense maneuvers are the first to be held in Tokyo and are a definite indication of the realization of the possibility that Tokyo might be attacked from the air, as well as to keep alive the wave of nationalistic feeling that has swept the country during the past two years.

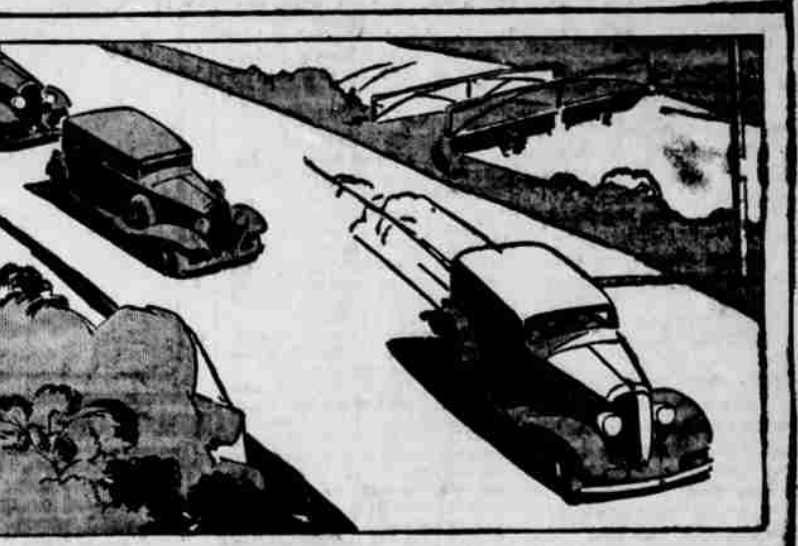
