Chicago Livestock

CHICAGO, July 26, (AP)—(U. S. D. A.)—Hogs, 20,000; market active, 15c to 20c higher. 200 to 250 lbs., \$4.60 to \$4.70.

Cattle, 9,000; not enough done to make a market on fed steers and yearlings; bidding 15c to 25c on all grades medium weight and heavier steers, and 10c to 15c lower on light steers and long yearlings. Heifers, \$5.50 to \$5.85; stockers, \$4.75 to \$4.75.

Sheep, 8,000; market around steady; native lambs \$5 to 10c higher at \$3.40 to \$3.50; talking around steady on yearlings.

The population per square mile in the United States is densest at Washington, D. C.—over 7,000 persons to the square mile.

Wheat and all other grains shot upward, especially late, after the market had been electrified by an authoritative trade estimate here that, owing to extraordinary crop damage still in progress, the wheat yield of the Canadian prairie provinces this season would be only 250,000,000 bushels or less, compared with 400,000,000 bushels harvested last year.

Wheat closed buoyant at the day's topmost point with a minimum net gain of 6 cents a bushel. Closing quotations on wheat were 5 1/2c to 5c above yesterday's finish, with corn 3 1/2c to 5c up, oats 3 1/2c to 4 1/2c advanced, rye showing 5 1/2c to 7c gain, and provisions a rise of 25c to 45c.
