

HARBOR RAILROAD PLANS CONSIDERED

GRANTS PASS, July 27. (AP)—Testifying before an army engineering board headed by Lieut. Colonel H. A. Finch assisted by two captains and a stenographer in his department, and delegates from Grants Pass and Medford yesterday brought up to date the data on this interior section's plea for a tidewater outlet to crop up in the Rogue and Klamath valleys a producing area the size of an ordinary state as the army engineers were told.

Authorized by a recent congressional committee act, the hearing was held simultaneously with Washington, D. C. Consideration of an application to the R. F. C. for a \$5,000,000 fund for rail construction from here to the Crescent City harbor, and to the L. C. C. for a certificate permitting work to begin. Prospects that harbor authorization and construction might proceed in concert with rail-laying were voiced by delegates returning from the coast hearing today.

him advised what is going on, and keeping him posted."

Mrs. Wilkins then asked: "Who is his lawyer?" and Fehi replied: "I don't need any lawyer. I am advising him all the time."

Mrs. Wilkins then remarked: "If the ballots are recounted, will Jennings get back as sheriff?" and Fehi replied: "I should say not. Jennings will never be sheriff."

The witness testified that she was present when her husband and Fehi were talking, and Fehi asked: "What will happen if the ballots are missing?" and my husband told him that would stop the recount.

Mrs. Nora B. McKerrick and Mrs. Elsie McKerrick told of Wesley McKerrick, Arthur La-

Dieu and Virgil Edington burning ballots in the kitchen stove of their home and hearing the trio say "their alibi time was up."

Mason Burley Sexton, former Coos county youth and one of the central figures in the robbery and destruction last February of more than 10,000 Jackson county ballots cast in the November general election, was the principal witness at the morning's sessions of the trial of Earl H. Fehi, county judge of Jackson county, charged with ballot-theft conspiracy.

The state charged that Fehi was the master mind of the conspiracy. Sexton has entered a plea of guilty and admitted on the stand that at a signal from Walter J. Jones, former mayor of the town of Rogue River, convicted of participation in the crime, he swung the axe that smashed the vault window, while the self-styled "Good Government Congress," cheered and R. C. Cummings, another co-defendant who has pleaded guilty, raced his auto to drown the sound of the falling glass.

Objection Voted

Sexton's testimony dealt with all the defendants and the defense objected to his mention of John Glenn, former county jailer and pensioned Spanish-American war veteran, acquitted on the Fourth of July on the grounds that Glenn had been freed, and the defendant, Fehi, could not conspire with an innocent man. The state contended that the defense's position was "unsound, fallacious and foolish" and that the same position could be taken on the cases of Walter J. Jones, Arthur LaDieu, and former sheriff Gordon L. Schermerhorn of Jackson county, all convicted of ballot-theft and called as defense witnesses.

The court overruled the defense objection except insofar as it concerned the "money deal between the Sexton Brothers and Glenn." The court held his decision in reserve until later in the day.

Sexton testified that Glenn had "propositioned" them to commit the crime and told them, when they complained "there is too much law around," that "you needn't be afraid, the sheriff and the county judge are with us."

Tools Selected

Sexton testified that Glenn, C. W. Davis, who has pleaded guilty, Walter J. Jones, convicted, and his brother Wilbur had gone to the basement of the Jackson county courthouse to pick out tools to break the vault window and had chosen an axe. Wilbur Sexton and C. Jean Connors, vice president of the "Good Government Congress," had passed out four ballot pouches, the Sexton's and R. C. Cummings' silt, filled with rocks and cast into Rogue river; how, when they returned from this expedition, Connors and Wilbur Sexton had passed out six more ballot pouches that were transported in the auto of J. Arthur La Dieu, former busi-

ness manager of the L. A. Banks newspaper. How Jones had warned the officials of the Congress not to leave the platform until La Dieu's car had been loaded; how the Sexton's stole 18 ballot pouches and destroyed them in the courthouse furnaces when no one came to remove them from the courtyard, and how the last five pouches had been removed by E. A. Fleming, Earl Bryant, and James D. Gaddy of Jacksonville, all who have entered pleas of guilty, was all revealed on the stand.

Pouches Identified

Sexton told his tale in a convincing manner and identified a number of photographs, ballot pouches and the tops of the ballots which were hidden beneath the courthouse, later to be removed by the state police.

Sexton testified that Claude Ward, a brother-in-law of L. A. Banks, convicted lawyer, had acted as one of the "guards." Sexton also testified that Defendant Fehi had been present at a gathering on the basement floor of the courthouse when preliminary plans of the robbery were discussed, and that when Fehi left to address a meeting of the "Good Government Congress," he had said, jokingly: "I'd hate to see you boys break into that vault."

Other To Be Called

Wilbur Sexton, 17, Virgil Edington, 24, and R. C. Cummings, who admittedly participated in the theft of the ballots, will be called to the stand today, it is expected.

It is not expected that the state will complete its direct case by Saturday, and that the case will be in the hands of the jury by next Thursday.

Under cross-examination Sexton remained unshaken and testified that he had seen Defendant Fehi in conversation with Jones on the evening of February 29 and that when Fehi asked him to come to his office when asked what he wanted, Fehi replied: "The d—d commissioners overruled me."

One juror asked if the ballots were burned in the furnace, when the "Good Government Congress" was in session, and another juror asked if the ballots had been thrown in Rogue river.

When opposing counsel got in an argument over whether or not a monkey-wrench was a weapon, the small courtroom crowd snickered, and the court rapped for order.

MOTOR COMPANY INCREASES PAY

DETROIT, July 27. (AP)—William S. Knudson, president of the Chevrolet Motor company, announced today a 15 per cent increase in the hourly wage rate for 40,000 workers in the 20 Chevrolet and Pontiac automobile plants in Michigan and other parts of the country.

The increase, he said, with the five per cent raise announced in May, makes the total increase 20 per cent.

Knudson announced all salaried employees earning under \$1,800 a year would be given an increase of 10 per cent.

"In making this announcement," said Knudson, "Chevrolet and Pontiac meet the shorter hours and higher wage program announced by the president for the working men on whom the prosperity of the country depends."
