

WELL KNOWN PIONEER DIES ON WEDNESDAY

The colorful career of another pioneer of the west, Oscar L. Carter, who found life adventurous, came to the final chapter on Wednesday afternoon when he passed away at his home, 421 Washington street, at the age of 72 years.

For a number of years Mr. Carter was manager of the Klamath Valley Warehouse and Forwarding company of this city, a company which he established about 1910, but he had not been active in the business for the past two years.

Was at Fair

The many adventures and episodes in which he played a part during his earlier years would read like a story, which is not surprising for his friends maintain he had nerves like iron. He was known among the frontier people as the fastest sheep-shearer in the United States and was sent to the World's Fair in St. Louis to demonstrate his proficiency in that line.

A short sketch of Mr. Carter's life appears in the "Centennial History of Oregon" from which the following facts were taken: He was born in Clay county, Missouri, August 25, 1860, and crossed the plains with his parents when a child of three years. At the age of 17 he left his home at Dayton, Oregon to become a cowboy in Eastern Oregon covering a range from Oregon to the Missouri river.

For 15 years Mr. Carter was a resident of Lassen county, Calif., and served as under-sheriff of the county for four years. He then spent five years managing a large stock ranch in Nevada, later moving to the Willamette valley where he engaged in farming until he came to Klamath Falls in 1906. He served as chief of police of this city for two years before organizing the warehouse company.

The history states: "He is numbered among the energetic, enterprising men who are making history in the west and whose labors are no less a source of public progress and prosperity than of individual success."

In 1887 Mr. Carter married Miss Rosa V. Haley, a native of Lassen county, who survives him along with three children: Ralph L. Carter of Seattle, Myrtle V. Morris and Dr. J. Hardin Carter of Klamath Falls, also four brothers and one sister. He was a member of the Klamath lodge No. 77 A. F. and A. M.

Open Season On Elk Announced By Game Group

PORTLAND, Ore., July 27. (UP)—Oregon's three-day open season for elk hunting is scheduled in four eastern Oregon counties from October 23 to October 25, according to the 1933 hunting laws, released by the state game commission Wednesday night.

Baker, Wallowa, Union, and Umatilla counties will provide hunting for the ungainly elk this fall. Oregon's elk population has increased 12 fold in the last 25 years, 12,000 of them now roaming the Blue mountain regions.

Complaints of ranchers that the elk were so numerous they were destroying crops led the last legislature to declare a short open season on them this fall. Only Wyoming has more elk than the state of Oregon.

Elk season includes the last three days of deer season, which runs from September 29 to October 25 inclusive.

Quail and grouse seasons west of the Cascades will be concurrent with the China pheasant season, October 15-31, and the sage hen season will remain closed this year, the code provides.

Johnny Risko Beats Loughran

CHICAGO, July 27. (AP)—Johnny Risko, the Cleveland baker boy, today held his first ring decision in four starts over Tommy Loughran, the Philadelphia dancing master.

Risko won over the Philadelphia by his aggressiveness in their ten round contest at Mills stadium last night. In the first round Risko opened a two-handed offensive that appeared to bewilder the former light heavyweight champion. He rushed Loughran to the ropes under a heavy body attack, spilling him with a left hook to the chin for a count of three.

The decision was not unanimous as one of the judges cast his vote for Loughran. The other judge, however, and Referee Tommy Thomas, favored Risko. Loughran weighed Risko 8 1/2 pounds, scaling 185.

English Champion To Fight In U. S.

CHICAGO, July 27. (UP)—Al Foreman, British Empire lightweight champion and holder of the Lord Londale belt, Wednesday was signed by Promoter Al Sweeney for a bout at Shrewsbury field the first week in September. Foreman will return to this country Friday after a three year round the world trip, arriving at San Francisco aboard the liner Maunabo. He scored 29 knockouts in 34 bouts on his tour. His opponent will be named later.

SAFEWAY TRANSFERS HEADQUARTERS HERE

Mr. Deville goes from here to Wenatchee, Washington, to assume a similar position. Mr. Mashburn will move his

family from Medford to Klamath Falls next week, and Mr. Muchow will leave shortly for Walla Walla.
