WHEAT PRICE LEAPS AHEAD EIGHT CENTS

CHICAGO, July 27. (AP)—Speculative buying of all grades spread like wildfire today, and prices shot skyward, with wheat showing a maximum gain of 8 cents. This was the extreme limit allowed under emergency rules. Temporary sharp reactions took place late as a result of immense profit taking, and because of some easing of the stock market at New York. Renewed feverish demand for gains, however, hoisted prices again.

CUBE BUTTER DROPS CENT; TREND WEAK

PORTLAND, July 27. (AP)—A further drop of 1c per pound in the price of cube butter during the late session of the produce exchange appeared to indicate the downward trend of values was being utilized too much by the interests opposed to adequate values at Portland. There was no doubt of the pending weakness in the butter trade here as a result of the action of country creameries in previously withholding their supplies from market, however. Decreasing make of butter was more than counter-balancing the holdover stuff. Butterfat price was set along with the weak in butter, with general 2 1/2c top for churning cream. Trade in eggs continued fully steady, with practically no changes suggested in the price list. Late receipts were slightly increased as a result of the opening of the pullet season, but others were short.
