The children then enjoyed a program of games, not, however, without keeping one eye on the road for signs of anything which looked like a dairy wagon. The ice cream donated by the Raymond Dairy and the Lost River Dairy, with cones from the Klamath Ice company, created a rush that kept the workers busy until it was all served.

The boys were taken back to the new natatorium for their weekly swim. The girls were brought back to the playgrounds. All the work of the recreation program is going along excellently according to Rev. Davis Preston, chairman of the committee. Large classes of boys are enjoying the manual training. A new feature is a class in electricity under Mr. Erdman. Camp cookery, under Mr. Carroll Howe, is being conducted in Moore park. The new natatorium is crowded with boys and girls Thursday and Friday afternoons, many of whom are quickly learning to swim. It is expected that the recreation program will be represented in the Legion parade with a float.
