Rogers Hornsby Makes Contact With Players. St. Louis Welcomes Old Star.

BY GEORGE KIRKSEY United Press Staff Correspondent CHICAGO, July 29. (UP)—It was ham and egg time when Rogers Hornsby, thirty minutes off a morning train...

Around the tables, where they sat in twos and threes, Hornsby, swaggering his old-time braggart confidence, called to greet each player with a smile, a ball player's hand-clasp and a "hello buddy, how're ya."

Hornsby radiated the enthusiasm of a rookie making his first appearance in the big show, and nothing at all like a man who has spent eighteen years in the National league, managed three clubs—the Cardinals, Braves and Cubs—and barely found a minor job as a utility player with the Cardinals last winter after being fired as Cubs' manager.

The players welcomed Hornsby enthusiastically and Carl Reynolds, Browns' star outfielder, echoed the reaction of other members of the team when he said: "Getting Hornsby as manager is one of the greatest things that ever happened to the Browns. The boys will be 10 per cent for him, and we believe he'll be a success."

Hornsby's first move after greeting the players was to call a closed meeting of the team, at which he let them know he was "boss" and that he expected every player to give his best for him. Hornsby's managerial motto of "You have to deliver or I'll have to get someone else" will hold good with the Browns. Hornsby will not tolerate a player who won't hustle and strive to win at all times.

National League Outfit Dangerous In Home Ball Park

A team of slugging specialists who find the small Philadelphia park just to their liking, the Phils have demonstrated time and again that they are a match to the strongest club on their home grounds. They proved their point once more Friday as they hammered the Boston Braves into submission 13-12, in 10 innings.

Berger Hits Homer Trailing by nine runs as the Braves shelled Flint Rhem and Johnny Jackson to score all their runs in the first five frames, the Phils tied the count at 12 all in the ninth when Don Hurst socked a home run with Chuck Klein on base and Wes Schalmierich followed with a triple that led to the tying run.

In the only other major league game of the day the Cleveland Indians tightened their hold on fourth place in the American league with a 7 to 2 victory over the Detroit Tigers and assumed a menacing position toward the third place Philadelphia club.

Oral Hildebrand gave only eight hits as he pitched his first full game in more than three weeks, and the Indians never headed after Earl Averill socked a triple with two on base in the first inning and scored a third run on O'Dell Hale's single.
