

U. S. JOINS WITH EUROPE TO END CRIME

By The Associated Press The police of Europe and America joined hands across the sea in a new international conspiracy as the drive against kidnapers and other criminals swept on today.

"The international world police" formed by eight chief police officers of several nations, will meet tonight. The aim is to exchange information and coordinate efforts to obliterate international crime.

Illinois set about a united effort to catch the kidnaping racket. Governor Horner conferred yesterday with federal state and local officials, who decided unanimously to present a united front to this menace.

St. Louis police held three men in what was called a plot to kidnap C. P. Delore, wealthy mine owner. In San Antonio, Texas, Adolph Galle, a parking lot operator, complained he was being followed by a man who he signed three blank checks.

The Chicago Tribune today said Wesley M. Sears, 31-year-old son of the late Richard W. Sears, one of the founders of Sears, Roebuck and company, had engaged a bodyguard following receipt of threatening letters. He is reported to have checked out of his hotel and to have left no forwarding address.

Mr. Sears is connected with a local brokerage firm. Attaches of the hotel where he resided professed to know nothing of his whereabouts or the threats, the newspaper said.

Grocerymen of the city adopted a code which will go into effect here Tuesday morning. Grocerymen of the city will hold another meeting Monday morning at 10 o'clock to make final plans for the adoption of their code Tuesday.

Retailers, including utilities and exclusive of food distributors and druggists, will meet Monday at 7:30 p. m. Monday for the county will hold its first meeting Tuesday morning at 9:30 o'clock.

Druggists of the city will meet Tuesday at 2 p. m. to accept a code of regulations. Barber's Meet. Barbers met Thursday evening and will again meet Monday evening at 7:30 to accept regulations.

Southern Oregon meat dealers will meet Sunday afternoon at the Ashland chamber of commerce to discuss the code already approved by the state association.

All meetings Monday and Tuesday will be held at the chamber of commerce. Maximum working hours for grocery employees to be effective Tuesday morning will be 49 hours per week. Operating hours are from 8 a. m. to 6 p. m. from Mondays to Fridays and from 7 a. m. to 7 p. m. on Saturdays. The work week shall be six days, excluding Sundays and national holidays or those called by the president according to the provisions of the code.

Stores owned and operated by not more than two owners, working without paid employees, shall be exempt from provisions of the code as to working hours. Other provisions of the code include: "The minimum wage for experienced male employees is \$15 per week.

"The offering or giving of rebates, premiums, coupons, gifts or free goods directly or indirectly, in connection with the sale of any goods is an unfair practice.

"The offering of any goods of the same quality, quantity and brand at a variation in price in stores under the same ownership is an unfair practice.

"That all discrimination between customers shall be abolished. To that end, all merchandise shall be sold only upon open prices and terms made known to all parties interested therein. That one price be maintained equally to all retail stores."

The grocery committee appointed by all grocerymen Thursday evening to approve the code was composed of Joe Schuss, chairman; E. L. Cramblitt, secretary; H. P. Babt, T. C. Griggs, E. E. Albrecht, L. F. Carter, committeemen.

MEDFORD JOINS MEDFORD, July 29. (UP)—Two hundred Medford employers agreed to comply with the regulations of the national re-

covery act at a rousing meeting at the court house today. Representatives of 38 retail groups, comprising all of Medford's merchants, adopted the code. Stores will close at 5 every day, including Saturday, and all day Sunday. No employer will work his help more than 40 hours a week.

PORTLAND, July 29. (UP)—The regional headquarters of the NRA today reported 2080 employers in Oregon and Idaho have sent in pledges promising shorter hours and no wage cuts in accordance with President Roosevelt's request.
