

# Motor Industry Backs Recovery

## DEALER SEES ADVANCE IN MOTOR TRADE

L. O. Arens, Plymouth and De Soto automobile dealer at 744 Klamath avenue, sees the quickening of business intercourse and credit relations of the country as led by the automotive and automobile finance corporations.

"It is truly remarkable," Arens said, "to realize that, while six months ago a man could not borrow ten cents for a loaf of bread, today he can walk into an automobile agency and drive out a new or used auto by simply signing his name to a credit agreement."

"From last Saturday until Friday noon we sold and delivered five new Plymouths—to Claude McCulloch, Rly. water company; Irving Dunn, Orr Campbell and Carol M. Howe. Business is good."

"The rising market and the spirit of the national reconstruction program, with which I am 100 per cent in accord, will unquestionably be reflected in the price of automobiles before long. Tire prices have advanced 25 per cent since May 5."

Used Car Market Better  
Arens also sees a big upturn in the used car market, due to the relaxation of finance companies' credit demands and the fact that stocks of used cars in dealers' hands are smaller than any time in the last ten years.

"The heads of the automobile finance corporations in Baltimore, New York, are more optimistic than any line of financial institution in the country's business structure. Credit possibilities to dealers are unprecedented," Arens said.

"The public will remember that the 1921 crisis was largely overcome by the tremendously optimistic and aggressive effort of automotive and automobile finance companies. Once again the automotive industry is head of the procession for optimistic courage and aggressiveness."

"I know this as fact, from 12 years experience in the automobile business," Arens said.

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## TERRAPLANE 8 SEALED IN HIGH GEAR CLIMBING MT. WASHINGTON

## Terraplane Sets New Record For Climbing Mt. Washington

When the next issue of the record book of the contest board of the A. A. A. is issued, it will be found that a new hill-climbing champion has been crowned this year.

Starting with Pike's Peak Labor Day, every hill-climbing attempt in competition or otherwise has gone to the Essex Terraplane Six or Eight. From Pike's Peak on Labor Day, 1932, to Mount Washington on June 30, 1933, every sanctioned climb has not only been won by a Terraplane, but in every instance a new record for the climb has been established. In many instances two records were made in the same day, first a new one

set by the Terraplane Six and then an even better mark by the Terraplane Eight.

The crowning achievement of all, the one which if it were not for its official character under complete supervision would challenge belief, is the high gear climb of Mount Washington.

Ninety per cent of those that make the climb depend on low gear and to get to the top in second is the mark of a powerful engine, yet the Terraplane Eight made the climb with the gear-shift lever wired and sealed in high in the teeth of a 55-mile gale that swept the rocky road above the timberline. In the vicinity the feat is regarded as little short of miraculous.

## C. C. C. OFFICERS PROBE ACCIDENT

## FORD SALES SET RECORD LAST MONTH

DETROIT.—Sales of Ford 8-cylinder cars and trucks in the United States for the month of June just ended, exceeded those of June a year ago by 19.4 per cent. It was the biggest month in 8-cylinder car sales since the Ford Motor company began producing them over a year ago.

Another evidence of the growing popularity of the 8-cylinder car is reflected in the sales of Ford cars for the month of June in Wayne county, Michigan. County registrations show that 2,555 Ford V-8's were delivered to customers during the month. This is an increase of 25 per cent over the May sales. It is more than the combined month's sales in the county of the two nearest other makes.

## Chevrolet Sales Show Remarkable Advance In July

Chevrolet sales at the Locke Motor company show an increase of 260 per cent for July of this year over July, 1932, according to Dick Miller, sales manager.

Automobile prices are even lower than they were in 1932, the previous low point, and are due for a rise some time before September, Miller said.

## COMMERCIAL CAR SALES INCREASE

DETROIT.—A decided increase in the use of 8-cylinder engines for haulage units is shown in the sale of Ford V-8 commercial cars and trucks in the United States since the first of the year. The increase has been most pronounced during the last two months.

The sales of Ford 8-cylinder commercial cars and trucks during June showed an increase of more than 60 per cent over May. The production schedule for July indicates that of the total four and eight-cylinder units to be produced during the month, approximately 75 per cent will be eight-cylinder type.

## REFRIGERATORS ON DISPLAY AT WORLD'S FAIR

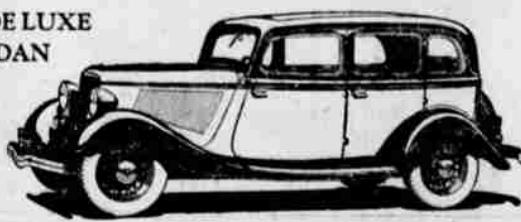
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
