

Coast Prepares For Season

Coaches and managers survey prospective material from high schools. Attendance mark may be set at Portland. Pelicans start in month.

It will not be a particularly purified Pacific Coast conference starting its pre-season football drive next month. Coaches and managers, both in the northern and southern divisions, have rushed through the school material with as much vigor as they did before the so-called reform.

Theoretically, no member of the conference can show an interest in prospective athletes until they are duly registered. Then if they can be persuaded to give their services patriotically to their schools, there is no conference law to prevent an open discussion of accommodations.

Every school can escape the law against soliciting players for every school unanimously breaks the regulations, then no school will make charges against another. That is the story on the coast this year.

Oregon State's athletic officials, headed by Lon Stiner, the new head coach, were through Klamath Falls several weeks ago "looking up old friends." Stiner saw friends and also talked a little football with some of the Klamath high youths who were graduated last June.

Before this month is over some one from the University of Oregon—Frank Callison or Billy Reinhart, probably—will stop off here "to look up old friends."

Those boys considered by Oregon as prospective varsity material will be interviewed.

San Wilderman, the young man who has kept the University of Oregon teams in the newspapers for the last ten years, has gone into a new game—law—in a particularly successful way. But Wilderman won't permit himself to be so busy as to forget football.

When the football season rolls around, and its almost here now, this Portland attorney, probably will once more direct the newspaper campaign for the Webfoot team.

Already he has won the excellent enthusiasm to promise the northwest a champion or a near-champion in Frank Callison's second entrant in the conference.

Just a little more than a month from now, Leslie Avritt, head coach, and Al Sinclair, line coach, will call out the Klamath high youths for opening football practice. It will be Avritt's third season with the Pelicans, and once more he will have a contender for the championship.

There will be many boys missing who contributed to the team last year. And it is possible some of those boys expected to return in September will be absent but, despite these vacancies, Klamath high will again be near the top of the Southern Oregon league when the season closes next November.

DEAN SHATTERS MODERN MAJOR STRIKEOUT MARK; YANKS DEFEAT SENATORS

Associated Press Sports Writer It was a busy week-end in baseball—the most eventful and exciting the major leagues have gone through this year.

Dizzy Dean of the St. Louis Cardinals shattered the modern major league strikeout record with the greatest feat in that line recorded in more than 40 years, whiffing 17 of the Chicago Cubs as he won the opener of Sunday's doubleheader 8 to 2.

The New York Yankees came back to trim Washington and cut the Senators' American league lead to two games.

Pittsburgh's Pirates tore past the floundering Cubs into second place in the National Saturday, then went on to reduce the New York Giants lead to 3 1/2 games. The Cardinals, by winning both games Sunday, also passed the Cubs, taking third by one point.

Rogers Hornsby took active charge as manager of the St. Louis Browns and saw his team run into the end of the Chicago White Sox losing streak and take a double drubbing. The Sox, who had dropped nine straight games, broke loose with a 34-hit attack, won the first game 8 to 7 in 10 innings then blasted out a 15-2 victory in the nightcap.

Dean's feat was by far the outstanding individual feat of the past two days. Not only did he record 17 strikeouts in a major league game for the first time since Tom Ramsey did it for Louisville in 1887 but he helped his catcher, Jimmy Wilson, establish a new modern mark of 18 putouts. The second game of the twin bill was an anti-climax as the Cards edged

back Father Time long enough to conquer H. W. (Bunny) Austin in a bitterly fought five-set duel, 5-7, 6-4, 4-6, 6-4, and squared the series at two victories apiece.

That shifted the burden of French hopes to Merlin's inexperienced shoulders but the youngster, despite a valiant fight against an obviously superior rival, went down with colors flying before Perry's brilliant attack 4-6, 8-6, 6-2, 7-5.

Thus did the British, who already had shocked the experts with their decisive victory over the United States in the interzone finals, climax a sensational Davis Cup campaign, winning the cup for the first time since 1912 and definitely ending French domination of world tennis after the tricolor had reigned unchallenged for a half dozen years.

Chicago Cubs Drop Grimes; May Join Cards

ST. LOUIS, July 31, (AP)—Burling Grimes, veteran spitball pitcher, has been released unconditionally by the Chicago Cubs, it was learned today.

Grimes, who was traded by the St. Louis Cardinals to the Cubs after the 1931 season, was informed after yesterday's doubleheader here he was a free agent.

"I'm going out to my farm near New Haven, Mo.," Grimes said. "I don't know what I'll do as far as baseball is concerned. I think there's still a lot of winning baseball in the old arm."

It was rumored Manager Frankie Frisch would ask President Sam Bronckson to add Grimes to the Cardinal staff for the remainder of this season. Grimes' brilliant and courageous hurling enabled the Cards to win the 1931 world championship.
