

Title Slips From Pelicans

Klamath Team Has But Small Chance to Win. Three-way Tie Possible Next Sunday. Edwards' Men Play Medford. County Series Planned.

Prison Edwards' ambitious baseball team, the Klamath Pelicans, have but a forlorn, outside chance to win the title of the Southern Oregon League.

But now, by all the statistics of a season of victory and few defeats, Coquille, an outfit dominating the top position since the start, will be crowned the first champion of a league that has managed to do fairly well in its opening year.

This week's schedule has been beautifully arranged for one of those traditional season-end upsets. Klamath Falls, going strong despite the loss to the leaders at Coquille, will meet Medford in the valley.

The leaders move against the rising Roseburg Veterans at Roseburg. The Vets, strengthening their lineup all through the season, will be in top form and ready to topple Coquille.

A victory for Klamath over Medford and another for Roseburg over Coquille would bring the tie and require a play-off for the championship.

Eagle Point and Ashland, the two tailenders, play at Ashland in the third game.

The league managed fairly well for a first year. Expenses were kept down and, although games were small, no team will come through to the end with more than a few dollars in the red.

It's a big country, this southern Oregon, and the expense of traveling was heavy. Coquille, most distant team, will have journeyed 771 miles at the end of the schedule, Klamath 639, Roseburg 492, Eagle Point 401, Ashland 332 and Medford 264.

Since this column today is devoted to baseball, it might be well to mention the prospective series between the Pelicans, the Klamath All-Stars and the Shaw-Bertram nine. Almost all the baseball talent in the county has been included in these three teams, and the rivalry has been developed through a long season.

The records for the season have given the Pelicans an edge, with the Stars second and Shaw-Bertram listed third as the darkhorse.

As soon as Edwards' team completes its regular schedule against Medford Sunday, some effort will be made to bring the three baseball enemies together.

OREGON GAME CHANGES MADE

State Group Announces Regulations for 1933 Season

Season and bag limit regulations established for the 1933 hunting season have provided new open areas and additional hunting time in several counties of the state according to statement made Tuesday by the Oregon State Game Commission.

Conditions in the field are reported excellent on both birds and mammals with the exception of white-tail deer and sage hens, both of which species are losing ground and on both of which closed seasons have been ordered this year.

Requests of sportsmen on the west slope of the Cascades that the quail and grouse season be concurrent with the China pheasant season have been granted.

Regulations governing the season on migratory waterfowl will be made public as soon as information is received from the federal advisory board.

A complete printed synopsis which will supersede all other orders will be in the hands of all county clerks and license agents by August 14 when regulations become effective.

Following is a brief resume of the open seasons, territories and bag limits as regulated by the Oregon State Game Commission:

ELK

Open Season—October 12 to October 25, both dates inclusive. Open Territory—All of Baker county; Walla Walla county north of the base line and west of the Imnaha river; all of Union and Umatilla counties except approximately 20,499 acres in the Conklin Springs area.

Bag Limit—One elk having two or more points on either horn.

License Fee—Resident elk tag \$2.50 in addition to resident hunting license; Non-resident elk tag \$45.00 in addition to non-resident hunting license.

DEER

Open Season—September 26 to October 25, both dates inclusive. Open Territory—All of Baker county; Walla Walla county north of the base line and west of the Imnaha river; all of Union and Umatilla counties except approximately 20,499 acres in the Conklin Springs area.

Bag Limit—Two Columbia black tail deer or 1 male deer, with the requirement that both deer tags must be affixed to the male deer.

SAGE HENS

Due to the serious depletion of sage hens in eastern Oregon, the season on these upland game birds has been closed for one year.

CHINA PHEASANTS

Open Season—October 15 to October 25, both dates inclusive. Open Territory—All of Baker county; Walla Walla county north of the base line and west of the Imnaha river; all of Union and Umatilla counties except approximately 20,499 acres in the Conklin Springs area.

Bag Limit—4 such birds in any one day and not to exceed 8 in any 7 consecutive days.

HUNGARIAN PARTRIDGE

Open Season—October 15 to October 25, both dates inclusive. Open Territory—All of Baker county; Walla Walla county north of the base line and west of the Imnaha river; all of Union and Umatilla counties except approximately 20,499 acres in the Conklin Springs area.

NEW BOXING GIANT CAN'T FIND RIVALS

By JACK CUDDY NEW YORK, Aug. 1. (UP)—After five years of training, Raymond Rosario Impellittere, America's rebuilt giant, has an 18 inch neck but no ring opponents.

Consequently, Harry Lenny, the gymnasium sculptor who put the neck on the Coliseum of Cold Springs, is much aggrieved and threatened today to take his masterpiece to Europe unless some boxer in the United States is brave enough to sign for a match within the next 30 days.

Lenny mournfully unfolded his story during a chat at his hotel. "Back in 1925 when Ray came out of Peekskill high school weighing 325 pounds, but with a 13 inch neck, they were all willing to fight him," he said. "But now try and get a match. They're all afraid of him because he's got a neck like a bull. They thought his neck was too small for his huge body and that they could knock him out easily. Maybe they could, I didn't let them try."

Big as Primo Lenny, the man who schooled a thousand boxers and who developed the champions, Johnny Wilson and Jack Delaney, has staked everything on the 33 year old son of a West Point barber, who now packs 260 pounds of brown upon his perfectly proportioned 6 foot 7 1/2 inch frame. He has given up his other fighters and is concentrating on guiding Impellittere to the heavyweight title.

PORTLAND MAN LEADS GOLFERS

City Champion Gets 68 As National Meet Opens

PORTLAND, Aug. 1. (UP)—Talbot (Tab) Boyer, Portland city champion and semi-finalist in the national tournament at Louisville, Ky., last year, shot a brilliant 68—four under par—to lead early finishers in the qualifying round of the national public links golf tournament today.

Boyer's card bettered by four strokes the previous low score of 71 turned in by Bob Hofer of Tarkenton, Ore. With approximately two-thirds of the field in, Boyer's card was considered virtually certain to win him medalist honors.

Bud Takes Third Hofer's par 72 sent young Bud Ward, Olympia, Wash., and Joe Coria, St. Paul, veteran, into a tie for third place. Each had a 73.

Trailing the leaders was Robert Lee Miller, Jacksonville, Fla., defending champion, who carded a 74. Miller came back strong with a 33, three under par, on the second nine, after a disastrous 41 on the morning round.

Tied with Miller, Jacksonville, Fla., links veteran, was Joe Green, Philadelphia public links champion, and Matt Palacio, of San Francisco.

The second 18 holes of the qualifying round will be played tomorrow, and the 32 low scorers will enter the championship round.

St. Paul, with Coria's 73 and Bert Bergman's 77, took an early lead for the Harding four-man team trophy, won in 1932 by Louisville, Ky.

Max Rosenbloom Loses to Negro At San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 1. (UP)—Flooding him three times in the first three rounds, and otherwise giving him a sound beating, John Henry Lewis, negro from Prescott, Ariz., easily defeated Maxie Rosenbloom, world's light heavyweight champion, in a ten-round fight last night. The title was not at stake.

Lewis weighed 178; Rosenbloom 175.

Only in the eighth and ninth rounds did Rosenbloom show any sparks of a champion. In those periods, he gave Lewis a fancy boxing lesson, winning the rounds without difficulty.

Lewis floored Rosenbloom for no count in the first with a right cross to the jaw. He requested in the second with a blow to the kidney. In the third, the champion felt to the canvas again and claimed a foul. The referee allowed it and Rosenbloom was given the round.

CHICAGO, Aug. 1. (UP)—King Levinsky, Chicago heavyweight, is courting a girl, Francis Fay, Brooklyn blues singer, and wants to get married.

SOLONS, YANKS SPLIT SERIES

Senators Cling to One Game Advantage In Close Race

By HERBERT W. BARKER Associated Press Staff Writer The Washington Senators and New York Yankees have wound up their crucial four-game series with honors even and the Senators clinging desperately to a shrinking lead.

Heated back in their first two attempts to storm the Senators' ramparts, the Yankees made it two in a row over the leaders Monday.

As Babe Ruth lead an 18-bi assault that gave Joe McCarthy, world champion, a 13-9 victory and put the Senators' lead to one game, just what it had been before the series opened last Thursday.

Stewart McHard Walter Stewart, Senator south paw who had stopped the Yankees cold in the first game of the series, was hit hard from the start and finally retired in considerable disorder in the midst of a seven-run rally in the fourth inning that definitely settled the issue.

Bob Burke came in to find the bases fully populated but Ruth solved that problem immediately with a smashing triple off the center field wall. The Babe who also collected two doubles and a single during the afternoon, later scored the seventh run of the inning on a fielder's choice.

Gomez In Form Vernon Gomez, slender southpaw, held the Senators in submission after the first inning when Washington counted three runs, until the heat forced his retirement following the eighth inning. Willy Moore, his successor, was hit hard in the ninth as the Senators scored four runs but they served only to make the score a bit more respectable. Dave Harris led Washington's attack with two home runs and a double.

In the only other major league game of the day, the St. Louis Browns made Manager Rogers Hornsby's home debut a success as they beat the Cleveland Indians, 12-8, in a wild game that developed into a marathon contest in the seventh inning. The Indians held an 8-4 lead at that point but Eben Bean, Oral Hildebrand and George Connally walked seven men and the Browns scored eight runs with the aid of a triple by Sam West and singles by Bruce Campbell and Jim Levey. Bill Cissell, Odell Hale and Willie Kamm bit homers for the Indians but they failed to save Cleveland from sliding into fourth place.
