WELFARE CLUB URGES CITY TO PROTECT PARK

At a meeting of the Northside Welfare club last week-end, a resolution was passed and presented the city park board, the mayor and city council urging the cleaning up of dry brush, dry grass and all underbrush in the timber of Moore park and suggesting that if it is possible, workers from civilian conservation camps be obtained.

The resolution in part reads: "Natural forest conditions within the park make the danger of fire one of the chief menaces to the beauty and permanence of the park and realizing the irreparable damage a fire within the park may cause, we hereby offer any support or assistance which we may be able to offer the board to the end that more adequate fire protection may be secured for the park. We suggest the building of fire trails in the timbered portion of the park, removing dead and inflammable debris to places where it may be burned and thus making the control of any fire that may start easier and quicker."

We also suggest that if it is in any way possible, the help of the civilian conservation corps be obtained as soon as possible to aid in such work."

The resolution was signed by Gomer Jones, chairman and Mrs. Knighton, secretary.

made by division of foods and dairies, state department of agriculture. A meat market proprietor at Hillsboro was fined for adulterating hamburger.

The department made 599 sanitary inspections, including 151 eating houses, 134 grocery stores, 131 dairies, 92 soft drink stands, 21 creameries, 18 bakeries, 10 fruit stands, 7 candy factories, 6 fish markets, 6 meat markets, 4 slaughter houses, 4 garbage plants.

A new mile track will replace the present half-mile oval at the state fairgrounds in time for beginning of the six-day racing meet Labor day. It recommendations of the Oregon state racing commission are carried out.

Max Gehlhar, head of the state fair, said the project is being considered. He attended a recent meeting of the racing commission.

Cost of enlarging the present track would not be excessive, Gehlhar believes. A mile track was located at the fairgrounds a number of years ago, but the new grandstand is built on part of the space it occupied.

"It was the opinion of the racing commission," Gehlhar said, "that since the state already has \$250,000 invested in its fairground racing plant, expansion might be advisable. Senator Julian McFadden of Corvallis, chairman of the commission, believed the enlargement could be made at nominal cost."

The races will be held in connection with the state fair, which opens Labor day.

KANSAS CITY, Kas., Aug. 1. (AP)—Elwood D. King, who went for the doctor when former president Herbert Hoover was born, died here at his home last night. He was 81 years old, and prior to his retirement several years ago, was a furniture salesman.

Mr. King attended school at West Branch, Ia., and one of his schoolmates was Jesse Hoover, father of the former president. He later worked in the Hoover blacksmith shop and stayed at the Hoover home.

KLAMATH SCHOOLS APPORTIONED FUND

SALEM, Aug. 1. (AP)—Apportionment of \$289,332 interest on the irrevocable school fund in the state was announced today by George Brown, secretary of the state land board which has charge of the fund. The per capita apportionment was made on the basis of \$1.11 per pupil for the 260,660 children between the ages of four and 20 years.

Multnomah county with 79,482 pupils was apportioned \$88,224. Marion county with 17,423 children of school age was apportioned \$19,339, while Lane county with 15,146 pupils received \$16,812.

Other receipts by counties included Baker with 5135 pupils, \$5,737; Benton with 4923, \$5,464; Douglas with 7080, \$7,855; Jackson with 10,102, \$11,213; Josephine with 3852, \$4,275; Klamath with 8238, \$9,138; Umatilla with 6705, \$7,445 and Union with 5093, \$5,559.

FARM MORTGAGE CAMPAIGN RUSHED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1. (AP)—A county-by-county campaign to speed refinancing of farm mortgages will be undertaken by the farm credit administration, which was authorized to loan up to \$2,200,000,000 to farmers at the last session of congress.

Henry Morgenthau, Jr., governor of the administration, explained today the campaign will be employed to expedite the mortgage refinancing program and to supplement plans already under way in five states for buying up farm mortgages held by closed and restricted banks to aid in their liquidation.

SALEM, Aug. 1. (AP)—Appointment of a successor to Judge J. W. Hamilton of Roseburg, who died Sunday, will not be made until later in the week, the executive office announced today.

ECONOMY SHOWN IN LONG JOURNEY

Making its mileage in round trips between Eugene and the Canadian border, the Ford V-8 showed an average of 19.22 miles on each gallon of the Fortified Red Lion, with an equally good performance on Lion Head oil, getting 25.3 miles a quart.

Three drivers, working the full 24 hours daily, kept the car going at all driving speeds to make a complete test of the gasoline and oil used. The speedometer from which the figures were taken was certified by its manufacturers as being absolutely accurate.
