CHICAGO, Aug. 2. (AP)—For the first time in almost a week, grain traders today could do business in volume of other than maximum price limits, up or down.

Higher prices followed the rule, and at no time did leading grains show any evidence of declining to bottom fixed levels, which were made effective yesterday for a period of two years. An outstanding feature of today was the evening-up of the speculative accounts in all the pits, especially closing of spreads between wheat and corn, with wheat being sold and corn bought.

NEW YORK, Aug. 2. (AP)—The stock market for today just about duplicated its performance of yesterday. After loafing along sleepily throughout most of an extremely dull session, mining and alcohol equities led a fairly brisk rally in the last hour, and other groups joined in the upward flurry. Many grains ranged from 1 to 3 or more points. The close was firm. Transfers approximated 1,500,000 shares.

The late recovery was attributed partly to a financial ticket service story from Washington to the effect that the administration might be expected to exercise some of its inflationary powers in the near future. Grains rose about half their limits in the restricted Chicago market, while wheat dropped 4 cents a bushel at Winnipeg. The dollar lost ground in foreign exchange dealings. Cotton rallied from its low point, and bonds were irregular.

Homestake Mining shares jumped 27 points in fairly brisk action. National Distillers advanced about 7 points in Unit 5, U. S. Industrial Alcohol 4 and American Commercial Alcohol 3. Others up 1 to around 2 included

JOHNSON BOOSTS BUYING CAMPAIGN

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2. (AP)—Plans for a nation-wide purchasing drive to supplement the government work spreading, wage-raising program were disclosed today by Hugh S. Johnson, recovery administration chief, in opening hearings on codes of competition for the cotton garment and kindred industries.

"We know that unless your goods are moved off your shelves you cannot keep up your part in this program," he said, incisively. "The time is approaching," he said, "and the signal will be merely the certainty that this plan is working—that people are back at work with a certainty that is no flash in the pan."
