# LUMBER CODE LOOKED FOR

Requests for information received by the West Coast Lumbormen's association indicate
that many interested people in
the lumber industry misunderstand what is occurring back at
Washington in connection with
hours and wages of labor in the
hearings on the national lumber
code.

The West Coast Lumbermen's association and the West Pine association, one speaking for manufacturing and logsers in the Douglas fir region of western Oregon and Washington, the other for similar groups in eastern Washington and Oregon, Idaho and northern California prepared separate codes, but each of those associations recommend a 40-hour week and a basic minimum wage scale of 424 cents per hour in mills; with two exceptions: The Douglas Fir asking for a 45-hour week in logsing camps at 424 cents per hour minimum, and the Western Pine recommending minimum wages in Arizona and New Mexico to be the same as in Southern Pine.
