LAKE VISITOR RECALLS FIRST EXPLORATIONS

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore., Aug. 4.—(Special)—Turning back the pages of time, W. E. Watson, Portland, a visitor in the park this week, vividly recalled experiences of 60 years ago, when first attempts were made to determine the depth of Crater Lake. The complete soundings of the lake were not made until 13 years later.

Mr. Watson's father, a blacksmith, came to Klamath Agency on the Klamath Indian reservation in 1873, to assist in the construction and launching of the boat, accompanied by his young son, who now recalls numerous incidents surrounding the event. The boat, a rough-made affair, was slowly let into the lake over snow banks by means of ropes.

750 Feet Reached
A small but active youngster, Mr. Watson was among the first to climb down the crater walls to watch the first Crater Lake launchings, and was among the first to clamber into the boat. It was rowed a mile or so from shore before a sounding line was played into the water.
A depth of 750 feet had been reached when the line broke. However, the party ascended Wizard Island and spent several hours in a short exploration, at the end of which names of the party were placed in a bottle and left on the island. Ten years later the bottle was recovered and the names published in a morning paper of Portland.
The boat was abandoned along the shore to the fate of lake storms. No further boat launchings were made until 1886, when the Cleetwood, constructed in Ashland, Ore., was used in making complete soundings of Crater Lake. After its usefulness had ceased, the Cleetwood was sunk near Wizard Island. During the summer of 1921 the wreckage was discovered and now pieces of the pioneer craft are on display at the park information bureau and community house.

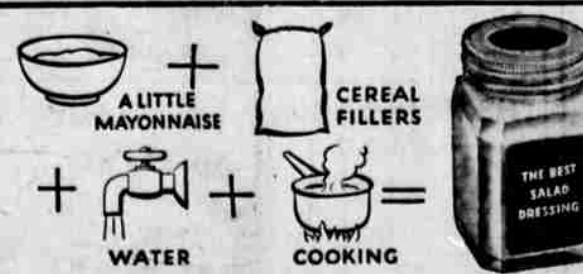
