POONA, India, Aug. 4. (AP)—After a brief moment of liberty, the Mahatma Gandhi was re-arrested today and immediately sentenced to one year in jail because he declined to remain in Poona and refused to cease his political activities.

The magistrate explained because of the Mahatma's age and physical condition, the sentence was only one year of simple imprisonment. Gandhi asked to be placed among the lowest grade prisoners.

National, Local Markets

TRADE LIMITED BY ACCIDENT ON EXCHANGE

NEW YORK, Aug. 4. (AP)—The stock market, already in a comatose condition with prices sagging indifferently, was literally gassed to an early finish today, when fumes from what was believed to have been tear gas bombs drove traders from the floor of the exchange.

The incident occurred shortly before noon. The ticker tape was barely moving, and most of the leading shares were down fractionally to around 2 points.

Closed Saturday

Under the recent ruling the exchange will be closed tomorrow. Transfers, up to the untimely end, approximated only \$99,999 shares.

Losers of 1 to 2 points included Commercial Solvents, Consolidated Gas, Alaska Juneau, Western Union, Bethlehem Steel, Hillis Central, Deere, U. S. Industrial Alcohol, Case and U. S. Steel. There were numerous fractional declines.

With security trading at a slow pace following the recent "house-cleaning," the jacking up of margin requirements under the exchange's new ruling seemingly put a further brake on the speculative grandstanding that had not only the higher margin regulation acted to restrain the more impetuous traders, but that the general psychology of the recent restrictions tends to embolden the small operator, as well as the large, with ultra-caution.

On the other hand, it is argued, the new rules are highly beneficial to the investor who generally buys his stocks and bonds outright and puts them away for a better day. An increase in cash selling, both yesterday and today, was reported.

Week and trade reviews were again optimistic, having found that the general uptrend in business is in more emphatic evidence. Gains generally, it was said, are being more evenly distributed, thus making for greater stability and uniformity in the forward movement.

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EX-POSTMASTER AT BLY ARRESTED

Thomas E. Wallis, former postmaster at Bly, was arrested Friday by U. S. Marshal Cal Wells at the B. K. ranch six miles east of Bly and charged with embezzlement on a federal grand jury secret indictment.

According to Wells, Wallis is charged with violating section 355, title 18, U. S. C. A. concerning shortage of post office funds at Bly in 1931. Details of the amount involved or facts concerning the case were not known by the marshal.

Wallis resigned his position in the Bly post office several weeks ago. He will be taken to Portland this evening with eight other persons who will face federal grand jury charges. He did not wish bail to be set and was not taken before the local U. S. commissioner.

BOSTON WOOL DEMAND SHOWS SLIGHT DROP

BOSTON, Aug. 4. (AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"The demand for wool has lessened this week, although the market has been a spot business and rather encouraging inquiry on the part of mills who apparently are checking up stocks against future necessities.

"Prices keep very steady throughout the list, both in the worsted and woolen goods, and by-products.

"The manufacturing position of the market is a very strong one. Mills at the moment are concerned chiefly with determining added cost under the code and are not giving much concern to new business. Some placing orders are being received to a modest extent.

"The foreign markets are generally steady, although considerably quieter in line with the midsummer holiday period.

"Mohair is rather quiet, but very firm.
