FERERRA WINS GOLF CROWN

Defending Champ Loses To California Star At Portland

By ARTHUR L. SCHOENI United Press Staff Correspondent PORTLAND, Aug. 5. (UP)—A stocky San Francisco steel worker, Charles Ferrera, won the national public links golf championship for the second time, here today.

He defeated Robert Lee Miller of Jacksonville, Fla., defending champion, four up and two to play in the final match this afternoon. Ferrera won the championship in 1931 at St. Paul, Minn.

Miller stubbornly up-hill battle all day. After he had apparently blown up entirely late in the morning round, came back in the afternoon, and doggedly whittled away at Ferrera's lead.

Not until he was six down to the San Franciscan, did Miller revive his game. Then he cut Ferrera's lead to five, four, to three. He slipped and Ferrera went again to four as they made the turn.

They were shooting the best golf of the day toward the end of the afternoon round. Miller cut his opponent's lead to three at the 28th, but he had spent his game then. They went around the 24th in halves.

Miller's Over. The 24th—the 19th—proved a heart-breaker to more than one entrant. It is a water carry of 148 yards to a green flanked by water on two sides.

Ferrera laid his ball just off the green. The Florida ex-caddy stepped to the tee and played his No. 7 from the ball dropped in the water, three feet short. He teed up again, and the ball went far over the green where he lay three with Ferrera stiff to the pin in two, and the match was over.

GIANT HITTERS ROUT PHILLIES

National League Leaders Find Power At Bat

By HUGH S. FULLERTON, Jr. Associated Press Sports Writer The New York Giants, who were holding the National league lead on pitching alone, suddenly have blossomed out as a team of hitters just when a bit of extra punch may come in very handy to help them down the home stretch.

They set up a season's scoring record in their current series with the Phillies on Wednesday and just to prove it wasn't a "fluke," they duplicated Wednesday's 18 to 1 score Friday.

Rhem Is Victim The Giants piled up 23 hits, most of them off the veteran right hander, Charles Surratt Rhem, to make their totals for three games 55 hits and 42 runs. They piled up a 7-1 lead in seven innings, then scored nine runs in the eighth when Rhem mixed passes with seven hits.

Every Giant except Lefty Clark, the starting pitcher who was relieved by Carl Hubbell in the seventh, had a hand in the hitting and Joe Moore, Mel Ott and Frank O'Doul cracked out for four blows each.

The Giants failed to gain on the second place Pittsburgh Pirates, who again found the trick of winning games in the ninth and defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 5 to 4.

Dodgers Lose Two The fifth place Boston Braves out the Cardinals' margin to two games by taking a doubleheader from the Brooklyn Dodgers, 4 to 1 and 3 to 0, behind fine pitching by Ben Cantwell and Bob Smith. Wally Berger contributed his 20th homer to the second victory.

In the only American league game, the Detroit Tigers went into fifth place, passing Chicago as they downed the White Sox 3 to 2 in 11 innings. Vic Sorrell allowed the Sox only six hits and Hank Greenberg drove in all the Tiger runs with a homer and a single.
