

GRUNOW FIRM SHOWS RAPID ADVANCEMENT

When a man has the courage today to bet a million dollars on trying to improve his business, that's news which makes people sit up and take notice. 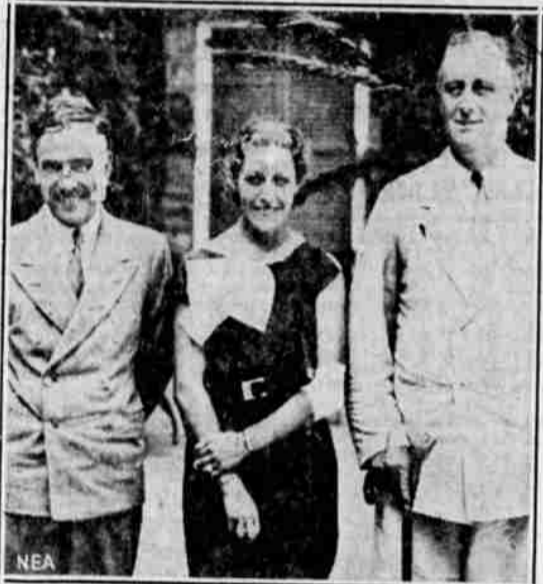

Lumber Strike of Klamath Is Ended

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Mill and Timber Workers' union, gave the following statement:

"Our membership voted Friday night to go back to work. We did so because we have faith that the President of the United States will see that justice is given to us when the government code is adopted. We go back to work firm in our belief that justice will be ours.

"We went back to work with the verbal assurance of the mill owners that no discrimination would be shown in placing men back in their old positions as long as their work was satisfactory. We accepted their statements in good faith and we feel confident that no man who offers to return to his job in a reasonable time will be discriminated against because of the strike.

"Let me say that I take great pride in the wonderful conduct of our membership. This is the first time in the history of the United States where men in strike numbers went out on strike and not a single covert act was committed. Our men are patriotic citizens and are deeply interested in our community and the welfare of its people. We are only asking for rights assured us by the federal government. Asking for rights and compensation in order to keep our families in comfort and for the welfare of our children.

"I want to express our deep appreciation to the officials for their fairness and to the public for their wholehearted cooperation. We go forward now with our work confident that the President of the United States, with whom we stand 100 per cent will see that our rights are recognized and protected, and that the mill owners will keep faith with us.

"The organization wishes to thank the disinterested community who acted in our behalf, also the C. L. U. and their delegates who worked with us. J. E. FIFIELD, Pres."

PORTLAND STUDIES TAX ON EARNINGS

In reply to a request from Commissioner of Public Utilities Ralph C. Clyde of Portland concerning the details of the gross franchise tax being collected by the city of Klamath Falls from four utilities, Mayor W. E. Mahoney described the process the city went through in obtaining the city ordinance in taxing the utilities here.

Clyde declared he was interested in securing a similar tax for Portland and asked for advice concerning the raise in rates or lowering of wages to absorb the tax.

In reply, Mahoney informed that the ordinance was introduced in the city council measure only with the franchise question not being involved. He explained that the collection of the tax did not cause an increase in rates as it could not unless the ordinance itself provided such a provision. Before this could be done, Mahoney explained the utilities would be required to make application to the state commissioner of utilities.

Mahoney stated his reason for asking a tax was due to the fact the utilities were enjoying a monopoly such as no other line of business enjoys. His letter in part stated: "Twenty years ago the people of Klamath Falls were disillusioned by the same propaganda and were told that any taxes collected from the utilities would mean an increase in rates. Nothing was done. The 20 years have passed and the same high rates set up continue to exist today. In the meantime the city treasurer has been deprived of this necessary revenue. In other words, if this tax had been imposed then, our taxpayers would have benefited by some \$200,000."

"(D)—Organizations or individuals selling goods at Retail shall be free to advertise truthfully their own goods, policies, services, and their own prices, but reference to the goods, policies, services or prices of competing retailers shall not be made.

"(E)—No individual or organization selling goods at retail shall make use of, participate in the use of, publish or broadcast any statement which lays claim to a policy continuing practice of generally underselling competitors.

"(F)—No individual store or organization selling goods at retail shall sell convict or prison-made products."

STORM DAMAGES WASHINGTON CROP

YAKIMA, Wash., Aug. 5. (AP)—The loss from a two-foot wall of water which rushed down a small canyon in the Pomona district, after an hour's hailstorm and a heavy rain, was confined today mostly to damage to fruit crops, as few houses are found in the area.

With some of the hail stones more than an inch in diameter ranchers said, the storm, last yesterday afternoon, practically destroyed fruit crops on half a dozen ranches. In places, the hail stones banked up more than a foot on the ground.
