BUYERS BOOST WHEAT MARKET NEAR CLOSING

CHICAGO, Aug. 5. (AP)—Decidedly mixed sentiment prevailed among wheat traders today, but buyers were in a majority at the last, and the market closed higher.

Lack of a broad speculative interest was largely responsible for rapidly shifting wheat fluctuations. At no time, however, did prices of any grain threaten to drop more than minimum limits, and there was fair buying support on all setbacks.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1c to 1 1/2c above yesterday's finish; corn, 1c to 1 1/2c up; oats, 5c to 5c advanced, and provisions varied from 7c decline to a rise of 10c.

LINDBERGH LANDS AT DANISH COLONY

SCOBESBY SOUND, East Greenland, Aug. 5. (AP)—Colonel Charles E. Lindbergh landed here this morning from Holstenborg, the first man to make the dangerous crossing of Greenland by air from west to east.

Colonel Lindbergh said weather and visibility were ideal.

He is making a survey of the north Atlantic area, intended to remain three days in this, the roughest Danish colony in Greenland. All the inhabitants, including the sheriff are Eskimos, with a single exception.

LAST SURVIVOR OF MASSACRE PASSES

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5. (AP)—The last survivor of the Whitman massacre, Mrs. Gertrude Jane Denny, 96, died at her home here today. She was the widow of Judge Owen N. Denny of Portland, and had been seriously ill since June.

For many years Mrs. Denny had been active in affairs of piety and charity. She was named Queen Mother of the Oregon pioneers. She was one of the last links with the early history of the state. She was born at Ten Mile Run, New Jersey, in 1837, and with her parents, Peter Hall and Eliza Hall, came to the Oregon country in 1847.

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Portland Livestock

PORTLAND, Aug. 5. (AP)—Cattle 1807, calves 150 for the week. While general prices on cattle showed practically no changes during the week, there was a slight bulge in quality steers, although nothing was available to force a higher top in any grades. Calves and weaners were considered steady. There was a better demand for cattle, especially the better grades.

Hogs, 3,783 for the week. Trade was generally steady. Tops again brought \$7.75. Not only for killers showing a steady tone, but feeder pigs were in excellent call.

Sheep and lambs, 7,059 for the week. Trade was inclined to show a steady tone, despite the smallness of the run. Both Mt. Hood and Mt. Adams lambs topped the trade at \$6.40 during the period.

Weakness in the butter market continued generally through the local trade, although there was no change suggested in week end values. Even the produce exchange bear leaders were unable to force further reduction in price for the week end session.

Makes of butter was seasonably liberal in practically every section of the country. Output of churners along the coast has been surprisingly liberal and at a time when there is usually a big decrease in operations.

One of the reasons for the local surplus appeared the uncovering of the flooded low lands which were now sending about twice the volume of butterfat to market as a week or ten days ago.

Trading in the egg market continued of cash character, but without change suggested by leading distributors. A greater per cent of the sales consisted of short held storage.

Market for chickens was holding firm at the week end. There was no further change in the price list. All sorts were in favor.

Springer stuff was generally selling as such instead of stacks which a few buyers were classing them.

At the week end quite a fair stock of country killed beef was carried over for the coming week, owing to the continued heavy offerings, the very low price and inability of the trade to keep cleaned.

Market for country killed hogs, lambs and veal shows a rather firm tone at the week end, and especially as regards top quality, quality lambs were being sought.

Berry prices showed a general firm market for the week end with increasing supplies. Raspberries, strawberries and youngberries at least touched the \$2.00 mark. Even Logans were more active.

Tomato prices were strong at the week end, increasing the improved tone of Friday. Prices were higher with the demand for supplies sufficient to clean up quickly all offerings.

The potatoes in this shipment are Klamath Netted Gems, and the first week in August is unusually early for this variety. The quality is excellent, however. The boxes bear the label: "U. S. No. 1 Klamath Selected Potatoes."

CHICAGO, Aug. 5. (AP)—(U. S. D. A.)—Hogs, 11,000; market dull, 10c lower, 19.00 to 19.10 lb., \$4.25 to \$4.50.

Cattle, 1,000; compared to a week ago, the market for fed steers and yearlings was strong; grass cows, weak to 35c lower; heifers, 50c to 75c higher; extra top of \$7.50 paid for good medium weight steers and long yearlings; yearling heifers \$6.15; fed steers, \$5.50 to \$6.75.

Sheep, 6,000; compared to a week ago the market for fat lambs was weak to 25c and more lower; native throwouts regained midweek losses; week's top \$8.25 also on both natives and westerns; late bulk natives, \$7.50 to \$7.75; westerns downward to \$7.00; sheep strong to 25c higher; ewes, \$1.50 to \$3.00.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5. (AP)—A proposal to fix a uniform retail price for cigarettes and cigars was contained in a code of fair practice and marketing agreement submitted to government agencies today by the national association of tobacco distributors and the retail tobacco dealers of America, incorporated.

The marketing provision, designed to come under the agricultural adjustment act, set up definite discounts which manufacturers shall allow to wholesalers, distributors and retailers and provided that each manufacturer post a fixed retail price for each brand of cigarette and cigars he produces.
