

SOCIETY EXTENDS WELCOME TO VISITORS ATTENDING AUXILIARY CONCLAVE

Entertainments Will Feature Three-Day Meeting in Klamath

THE PORTALS of the city will be thrown open this coming week to welcome the visitors and delegates attending the Oregon state convention of the American Legion auxiliary and society will center about the various affairs being given in their honor on Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The Fremont school auditorium will be headquarters for the auxiliary meetings and the first meeting will be called to order by the department president, Mrs. Alice George, at half past eight o'clock on Thursday morning, August the tenth.

The business sessions will be interspersed by a number of special entertainments that will commence with the public opening of convention ceremonies at the Pelican theatre Thursday morning at nine o'clock. At this time there will be an address of welcome by Mayor W. E. Mahoney, addresses by officers of the local Legion and auxiliary and by state officers. Frank E. Samuel of Indianapolis, national adjutant of the American Legion will also be on the program. The auxiliary trip of the Salem post, which now holds the national championship will present several numbers, and there will be selections by the National glee club of the Rose City post of Portland and the national champion drum corps of Salem.

At noon district presidents and past district presidents will be honored at a luncheon in the parlors of the Methodist Episcopal church. Lunch will be served to the visitors each day in the parlors of this church.

From four until six o'clock in the afternoon of the first day the distinguished guests will be complimented by delegates, alternates and visitors at a tea at the Methodist Episcopal church. The music contest which is annually one of the outstanding events of the convention will be held at seven-thirty o'clock at Fremont school auditorium. There will be seven or eight units and the state champions of glee clubs and trios will be decided.

The night parade, the first of its kind to be held at a Legion state convention, will start at nine o'clock and will be the largest and most colorful event of the entire program. This will be followed by a midnight matinee at the Pelican theatre at eleven o'clock, which will include clever stunts from the various auxiliary units of the state and a motion picture. Mrs. L. K. Porter is in charge of the matinee.

The second day of the convention will start with a breakfast for unit secretaries, treasurers, past secretaries and participants at the parish house of St. Paul's Episcopal church. Breakfast will be served by members of St. Paul's Wednesday club at seven o'clock.

A parley dinner for presidents and past presidents will take place at six o'clock Friday evening at the parish house of St. Paul's Episcopal church. Adjourning at eight o'clock for the drum corps contest at the fairgrounds. Dancing at the exhibit building and Altamont will complete the evening.

The presentation of trophies, cups and citations will be made at the Saturday morning meeting at eight o'clock.

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'Give Service' Second Law Taught Camp Fire Girls

(Editor's Note: This is the third of a series of articles on Camp Fire Girls which is being written by Miss Nell Napier. The article on this page last week told of the first law, "Be Healthy," and this week Miss Napier tells of the second law, "Give Service.")

Another girl from the other side of the room, after a slight pause, followed with the second law of the fire:

"The second law of the fire is 'Give Service.' Give service has so long been a continuous tradition in Camp Fire, and so firmly is it rooted in our program that it has become our slogan. Girls in 25 countries raise their banners of service high. And the joy that we can find in giving service to others, to our friends, our community, our city and our country. 'With skill to serve—by love impelled, her hand will never be withheld.' We dedicate ourselves to the service of others.

"In a deep sense, giving service is as much an art as is composing a wonderful song, or painting a lovely picture. Some people try hard to be helpful, we know, but they are bunglers—they seem to do the wrong thing. We do not appreciate their help, as much as we might admire their motive. They have not learned the art of giving service gracefully. To give service in the complex relations of modern life is the highest, hardest and most complicated art there is. Women have always excelled in giving service in social ways. It takes love, insight, and lots of knowing how. This is the reason why just trying to give service is not enough. We can not help unless we know how—it is not a matter of sympathy and earnestness. To cure headache and loneliness takes more skill than to cure a headache, or set a broken bone. Thoughtless giving is the cause of more harm than good.

"A person who is thoroughly educated to give service will have the broadest kind of an education—of body, mind, and heart. Some educational programs forget to train the hands in the arts. None of them train the sympathies. Camp Fire proves itself here, and in teaching the girls how to give service, it makes much of the art of the hostess, hiking, singing and slaying together—in short, how to work and give together.

"Those who work for pay need to strive earnestly to give the finest service of which they are capable, for in this way wage and salary earning is changed over from wages and slavery into real living. If we just do what is necessary to be paid, it is in a way, degrading. If we give service it is uplifting and joyous. If we do the work as our own, we secure the legitimate returns in character in addition to our salary.

"It is beautiful that the law 'Give Service' is so closely attached to the law 'Be Healthy.'

"Camp Fire has taught me what happiness and friendship come from giving service to others, with others."
