WESTERN KANSAS FLOOD RECEDING

SCOTT CITY, Kan., Aug. 7. (AP)—Flood waters which swept over sections of western Kansas Saturday, causing one death, had receded today leaving in their wake unestimated damage to property and losses in livestock.

Mahatma Gandhi's Wife, Friends Free

AMHERDABAD, India, Aug. 7. (AP)—Mrs. Mohandas K. Gandhi, wife of the nationalist leader, and 15 other members of the Mahatma's college of devotees were released temporarily today from Sabarmati jail here, where they were imprisoned after Gandhi's arrest Aug. 1 at the outset of a new independence movement.

Mrs. Gandhi and her companions were ordered to go to a specified area, but they refused and were rearrested.

Salem Watchman Dies in Battle

SALEM, Aug. 7 (AP)—With few clues to follow, police stated today that no arrests had been made for the slaying of Night Watchman Howard Jones, 49, in a gun battle early Sunday morning at the early Packing plant.

Residents of the vicinity heard a series of shots fired about 1:10 o'clock Sunday morning and rushed to the scene. They found Jones lying against the main building of the meat packing plant.

TYPHOON KILLS MANY.

TOKYO, Aug. 7. (AP)—A typhoon in southern Korea last week was reported today to have resulted in 78 deaths, the destruction of 2,624 houses, and the loss of 271 boats. More than 150 persons were said to be missing.

JUNGLE CAMP GIVES SHELTER FOR CHILDREN

The South Sixth street transient camp provides sanctuary to approximately a dozen women and children daily, as well as to its regular clientele of about 400 men guests, according to reports from Chief of Police J. R. Shaw.

The women and children are given four cabins or shacks which have been constructed on the grounds of the big camp, and they eat with the men in the cook house, where they are shown every courtesy, the chief says.

Family Seeks Work

Last Saturday night a tired young man and his wife, with a 6-month-old baby, timidly entered the police station and asked if they might have some food. They had traveled from Sacramento via freight train, and were on route to Ellensburg, Wash., where the young man had hopes of obtaining work.

They told officers that they had never before traveled in this manner, and that they were frightened but they had no choice. The young people were taken to a restaurant and fed as the camp dining room had closed. They were also given lodging for the night and were very grateful for the help.

One woman stayed in the transient camp for 10 days, where her sick child was treated and nursed back to health. Then they "hopped" another freight and moved on.

Nearly all the travelers seem to have a definite destination, the chief says, and a large majority are moving on and on in the hopes of finding work.

Travel Increases

Travel in and out of the "jungle" has steadily increased during the summer, with the first week in August recorded as the heaviest so far this year.

An average of 350 meals are served every day to the hungry travelers and the dining room is open from 9 o'clock in the morning until 9 o'clock at night.

The chief maintains the camp for about \$600 a month, which includes all provisions and overhead cost of help, fuel, etc., according to the chief's report.

Only one man in the kitchen is paid wages, and he receives only \$1 a day to act as general manager and supervisor. Six men work in the kitchen from morning until night, and receive only their board and lodging.

Donations Many

Large quantities of vegetables are donated to the camp and are collected from local stores and commission houses each morning by special police detail. Meat, coffee, sugar, bread and other provisions are purchased by the police department.

All residents of the city are requested to send transients who come to the door and ask for food to the city camp, instead of giving them something to eat.

In this way the police department hopes to keep so-called "tramps" off the streets, and to eliminate all pan-handling in the city.

American Scouts Touring Hungary

GODOLLO, Hungary, Aug. 7. (AP)—With fifty boys left behind to perform the necessary duties, the American Camp of Boy Scouts was almost deserted today as the others devoted the entire day to sightseeing in Budapest. They planned to return at midnight.

English scouts, here for the fourth world jamboree, played the part of heroes yesterday on Lake Balaton when, using a motor boat, they rescued Count Egon Salm and his party, whose sailing yacht was wrecked in a squall.

Suspects Arrested In Portland Death

PORTLAND, Aug. 7. (AP)—William Edward Smith and his wife, known as Lillian Foley, were held in jail here today for police questioning into the death yesterday of Samuel Taylor, 39, a logger, who was found dead in the southeast Ankeny street home of the Smiths. The coroner said Taylor was killed by heavy blows on the head.

Mrs. Dempsey Speaks Another Cheerful Earful

AMARILLO, Tex., Aug. 7. (AP)—Hannah Williams Dempsey, the former "cheerful little earful," has a new ambition in life—to be "the mother of Jack Dempsey's children."

"I want it to be known that we are going to have babies," she said.

"I never had any career," she continued. "All I want is to be a mother to Jack's children, cook his beef steak and eggs, and to be known as Mrs. Dempsey. If that means long train rides and one night stands such as we are making here, that's what I want to do."

GROWERS ATTEND OREGON HEARING

Twelve members of the Klamath Potato Growers' association returned Saturday evening from Redmond, Ore., after attending a state hearing on the proposed revisions of U. S. potato grades.

The local potato growers expressed themselves as being well pleased with the results of the meeting, and many of the changes in potato grades follow recommendations made by the Klamath growers at a meeting held at Henley last Friday night.

The Redmond hearing was the only one of its kind to be held in the state in accordance with an Oregon law which provides for one public hearing on any proposed changes in U. S. potato grades. There were about 60 growers from all over the state in attendance at the meeting, and those from the local association were Clyde Griffith, president; Ira Orem, S. P. Dehlinger, Al Durant, Henry Semon, Jess Johnson, Harry Jackson, E. N. Eagle, G. A. Hilbard, Percy Dixon, Ross Aubrey and C. A. Henderson, county agriculturist.

The hearing was conducted by W. L. Close, federal grade supervisor, and C. A. Cole of the state department of agriculture at Salem.

The assembled growers voted to adopt the new U. S. grades, provided the following changes could be incorporated: 1. That the U. S. commercial grade be eliminated, and 2. that the unclassified grade be eliminated, and that the word "culls" be substituted for the term "unclassified."

Other changes called for in the new grades were considered to be an improvement over the old grades.

The minimum size of U. S. No. 1 potatoes under the new grades will be 1 1/2 inches, whereas the old minimum was 1 1/4. This change in size was only one of several minor changes made in the new grading schedule.

Definitions of terms in the new grading were approved as both growers and inspectors felt that these were more clear cut and easier for inspectors to interpret than were the old definitions.

Considerable discussion was precipitated at the meeting, according to reports from those in attendance, by various misapprehensions in the new grades. Several changes were recorded to simplify the wording without changing the content.

After considerable discussion sizes of A and B potatoes in all grades were added, making it possible to use these sizes designated under the new grades.

The state department of agriculture hopes to have the grades formally adopted and in working order by the time potato digging starts this fall.

As soon as the changes are incorporated, copies will be sent out to growers and the new grades will be made "while in detail in order that all growers may become familiar with the changes."

QUESTIONS OF NRA PROGRAM CLEARED AWAY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7. (AP)—What does the N.R.A. mean? The following questions were developed and answered today by officials of the national recovery administration.

Are small businesses, employing only a few persons, required to pay stated wage scales and observe the hours specified in the blanket code?

They are.

How are unchartered home industries, such as home laundries, affected by the N.R.A.?

Where only one person is engaged in such industries he or she is not affected. Where more are at work, the business is expected to come in under the blanket code.

What about firms having curb service and employing several small boys or young men to serve cars at the curb?

The minimum wage for a part-time worker in such businesses is expected to be such that if the employer worked at that wage for a full week or 40 hours, he would receive the minimum weekly wage prescribed for him by the president's reemployment agreement.

Is an employer expected to discharge employees where he has been spreading work by means of the "share-the-work" movement so as to give regular work for a less number of workers?

No.

Compensation of employees above the minimum wage group, whether now fixed by the hour, day, week or otherwise, shall not be reduced, either to compensate the employer for increases that he may be required to make in the minimum wage group to comply with the president's reemployment agreement, or to turn this agreement into a mere "share-the-work" movement without a resulting increase of total purchasing power.

Is an employer who has signed the president's reemployment agreement aiding by its provisions if he turns off any of his employees?

He is not complying with the spirit of the agreement.

Iowa Man Dies From Gun Shot

SALEM, Aug. 7. (AP)—The body of Donald Silver, 33, who died yesterday as a result of a suicide attempt a week before, will be sent to Webster City, Ia., for interment.

For a week Silver was fed through a tube in a local hospital. The self-inflicted shot which eventually brought death tore out his jaw.

Coos Bay Firm Resumes Work

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Aug. 7. (AP)—Sixty Coos bay men went to work today in the Mac Kenna mill which reopened this morning at Eastside. Company officials, who did not announce the present wage scale, said they believe continued operation is probable.

Tacoma Lumberman Passes Suddenly

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 7. (AP)—William H. Hewitt, 64, member of a pioneer Tacoma family and widely known northwest lumberman, died here unexpectedly last night.

He was the son of the late Henry Hewitt, the founder of Everett, Wash.

Hewitt, who came to Tacoma in 1889, was vice-president of the Hewitt Land company and also the vice-president of its several subsidiaries throughout the northwest.

His widow, two sons and a daughter survive.

FIREBUG BLAMED FOR THREE BLAZES

The police department is searching the city for a firebug who started three fires in unoccupied houses between 3 and 9 o'clock Saturday evening.

The three houses which burned, two of them completely destroyed, were all in the northern part of the city. The fire department was first called to 124 Trinity street at 8:45 o'clock where flames were raging in a small, unoccupied frame house belonging to Chas. J. Howell.

While fighting the fire in the Howell house, a second alarm was turned into the fire station from 2355 Montelius street, where two adjoining houses were burning. The Montelius street houses belonged to Wm. J. Nicholson and Norman Smith, both of whom carried \$500 insurance. The Howell house was uninsured.

The Nicholson house was only slightly damaged, and Fire Chief Bardell discovered a crudely placed pile of rubbish and papers which had been lighted to start the fire.

Smith's house was a total loss.

LINDBERGH FLIES SAFELY OVER FOG

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, Aug. 7. (AP)—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh was reported today to have made a daring flight on Sunday through fog and rain from Scoresby Sound, East Greenland, to Angmagssalik, another settlement on the Eastern Greenland coast.

He started in the morning and arrived in the afternoon, it was said. He was handicapped by adverse weather conditions, but all went well.

On Saturday Colonel Lindbergh made the first west to east crossing of Greenland. His next goal on the aerial mapping tour he is making with Mrs. Lindbergh will be Akureyri, Iceland.
