WHEAT PRICES HOLD STEADY; MARKET QUIET

CHICAGO, Aug. 7. (AP)—Despite announcement of 3,057,000 bushels increase of the United States wheat visible supply total, wheat prices displayed steadiness late today at a little under Saturday's finish.

There was no pronounced buying or selling, and speculative interest was restricted owing more or less to holidays at Winnipeg and Liverpool. Many operators appeared uncertain as to the immediate trend of the markets, and were disposed to go slow pending fresh developments, especially at Washington.

Wheat closed easy, 1c to 1c 1/2 off; oats, 1c to 1c down, and provisions unchanged to a setback of 15c.

NEW YORK, Aug. 7. (AP)—The stock market drifted indifferently today through one of the year's investors hugging the side lines. Most leading issues followed an extremely narrow range. The close was moderately irregular. Transfers approximated 700,000 shares.

Brokers reported the new trading regulations, including higher margins and other restriction designed to curb excessive speculation, had diminished the pace of even the largest operators. The tape was motionless for minutes at a time, and about the only activity was furnished by floor dealers passing a few stocks back and forth. Most grains and cotton were easier. Bonds were mixed. The dollar worked higher in foreign exchange transactions.

There were greater supplies of California peaches here for the day. Retailers were being warned against purchasing supplies unless they were properly marked as to grading. Prices were on a nominal basis.

With The Dalles practically cleaned up, the only remaining supplies of "cots" in this territory were from Yakima, and prices there were being held firm as a result. Quality was fair.

Prices were holding up well in the market for country killed meats with the continued exception of beef. The latter remained in an over-supply, and prices were a trifle easy.

Cucumbers for slicing and for pickling were plentiful and generally very low priced.

All berry prices were lower except raspberries, which are scarce.

Good peas were scarce and slightly higher priced.

Green apples were down to 6c to 7c per lb.
