

McNARY BACKS RECOVERY PLAN OF PRESIDENT

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 7. (AP)—Senator Charles L. McNary, who with Mrs. McNary returned today from Washington, D. C., declared the program of President Roosevelt, supported by the congress, has inspired confidence and courage, and doubt has been given way to doing.

McNary cautioned that "to oppose the president now in a purely partisan spirit would be rocking the boat at a particularly unfortunate time." He added that "when the time comes for another national election we may have plenty of issues, some of which underlie the political structures of the two major parties, and some which may arise out of the distressed economic conditions which may not be helped by administration measures."

Senator Optimistic.

"I share the belief," he said, "that within the next year there will be substantial thinning of the ranks of the unemployed, returning prosperity marked in character, and general business revival that will be wholly satisfying."

Senator McNary said he has an abiding faith in the statement of President Roosevelt that he will cause to be constructed a dam in the Columbia river at a site to be recommended by the chief of army engineers.

The site probably will be near Bonneville, the senator said, with the dam to be used for development of electrical power, flood control, prevention of erosion, and promotion of deep water navigation on the Columbia river.

The senator stopped here for breakfast and then motored on to the McNary farm near Salem where he will rest until he returns to Washington in the fall.

TREASURER BUYS COUNTY ROAD BONDS

County Treasurer George P. Taylor announced that he recently purchased \$21,000 worth of county road bonds issued July 1, 1933, and bearing interest at five per cent, paying 95 cents on the dollar, saving the county \$2,245 on interest and principle.

Twelve thousand dollars of those purchased were due July 1, 1934. The remainder purchased was due July 1, 1935. The deal was the second Taylor has made this year buying the bonds at a discount rate.

The money was taken from the road bond sinking fund which has a total of \$154,000 remaining for other bonds. An issue of \$12,000 is the only remaining road bond issue coming due this year. When the amount is matured, November 1, the county will have retired a total of \$68,000 worth of road bonds this year.

TACOMA INTERESTS BY LUMBER PLANT

BAKER, Aug. 7. (AP)—Plans for a new lumber operation in Baker county to employ 60 men within the next few weeks were announced today. Hewitt brothers of Tacoma have made arrangements to purchase the planing mill formerly operated by the Stoddard Lumber company here but abandoned four years ago when the Stoddard company bought the Baker white pine mill.

The Tacoma interests are building a \$6,000 foot daily capacity sawmill at Sumpter, 35 miles up the Powder river from here. Timber owned by the Hewitt Land company will be logged, cut at Sumpter and finished here. The operation is slated to start September 10 with Frank Gardiner of this city in charge. This will be the fourth lumber company operating in the Baker district.

"I have never seen so much interest manifested in a southern Oregon convention," was the statement concerning the American Legion state convention opening here Thursday by Horace Bromley, advertising manager for the California-Oregon Power company at Medford who was commander of the Medford Legion post during the state convention there in 1932.

Bromley has been assisting with the publicity for the convention here and after spending the week-end in Klamath Falls said he could assure the largest representation of Medford people this week that has ever participated in a Klamath gathering. PORTLAND STUDIES TAX ON EARNINGS

In reply to a request from Commissioner of Public Utilities Ralph C. Clyde of Portland concerning the details of the gross franchise tax being collected by the city of Klamath Falls from four utilities, Mayor W. E. Mahoney described the process the city went through in obtaining the city ordinance in taxing the utilities here.

Clyde declared he was interested in securing a similar tax for Portland and asked for advice concerning the raising of rates or lowering of wages to absorb the tax.

In reply, Mahoney informed that the ordinance was introduced as a revenue measure only with the franchise question not being involved. He explained that the collection of the tax did not cause an increase in rates as it could not unless the ordinance itself provided such a provision. Before this could be done, Mahoney explained the utilities would be required to make application to the state commissioner of utilities.

Mahoney stated his reason for asking a tax was due to the fact the utilities were enjoying a monopoly such as no other line of business enjoys. His letter in part, stated:

"Twenty years ago the people of Klamath Falls were disillusioned by the same propaganda and were told that any taxes collected from the utilities would mean an increase in rates. Nothing was done. The 20 years have passed and the same high rates set up continue to exist today. In the meantime the city treasurer has been deprived of this necessary revenue. In other words, if this tax had been imposed then, our taxpayers would have benefited by some \$200,000."

He was vice-president of the Pennsylvania railroad during the war, was federal manager of the road's eastern lines under the United States railroad administration.

During his 40 years with the railroad, he rose from rodman to vice-president. Born in Chicago, he was educated at Binghamton, N. Y., schools and Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

He took a prominent part in relations between the road and its employees.

KILLED ON PASS.

BEND, Ore., Aug. 7. (AP)—Ray F. Brandon of San Francisco, advance man for the Danversport Society circus, was fatally injured yesterday in an automobile accident on McKenzie Pass highway, near Summit. He was found by passing motorists and died last night in a hospital here.

MAN ADMITS HOLDING UP GAS STATION

Bob Taylor alias Gilbert E. Ralph has confessed to the hold-up and robbery of Dean Hall's service station on 80th and Sixth street early in the morning, and also to the larceny of a large sedan belonging to V. R. Lavigne, and taken from the vicinity of the Altamont dance hall Saturday night, according to reports from the police department.

Taylor was taken into custody at the corner of Canby street and Crescent avenue a few minutes after the police had been notified of the car theft and hold-up.

Lavigne reported that his car was stolen at 11:47 o'clock, Saturday night. At 11:52 the service station attendant reported that he had been held up by two men in a large sedan, one of them armed with a .35 calibre revolver.

Taylor alias Gilbert was arrested shortly after midnight, driving the stolen car and admitted the robberies, officers stated. He declared that he threw the revolver away shortly after the hold-up, but could not remember where he had buried it. He was taken to the county jail where he is held pending hearing.

PORT KLAMATH, Ore.—Following is a tribute to the memory of Mrs. Millie M. Hoyt which was written and read at a meeting of the Fort Klamath Civic Improvement club by Mrs. Myrtle B. Wimer, the secretary:

"These words are written as a tribute in memory of our beloved club sister, Mrs. Millie M. Hoyt, whose passing Wednesday night, while not unexpected, nevertheless

less has saddened the whole community. In Millie's passing, we have lost one of our most faithful, unselfish club workers, entering in her efforts for the good of the club, and even when the shadow of death was very close to her in the last days of her lingering illness, her keen interest in affairs of the club never failed. Although Millie could not be with us in person at our meetings, she said that she was always present in thought every club afternoon.

"Millie was a member of the Civic Improvement club of Fort Klamath for many years, joining soon after it was formed and being a long-time member, up to the time of her death. She was at one time secretary of the club, and later filled the office of president for four successive years. GERMANS DISAGREE ON NAZI PROGRAMS

BERLIN, Aug. 7. (AP)—The German government refused today to agree with the contentions of France and Britain that Nazi political propaganda in Austria constitutes violation of existing treaties.

Berlin reminded the power that for this reason Germany holds "this interference in the German-Austrian difficulty as inadmissible."

Britain and France had made representation to Germany concerning propaganda activities on the Austrian border, directing the reich's attention to its responsibilities under the Mussolini four-power pact to preserve peace.
